CENTER CITY LUNCH & LEARN: JUDAISM, SOCIAL JUSTICE & THE LAW

Instructor: Rabbi Leonard Gordon

Rabbinic Judaism teaches that study is greater than action because study leads to action. In this series we will study a set of texts, ancient and contemporary, connecting Judaism, Social Justice & Law. We will examine multiple perspectives on complex issues such as environmental ethics, business law and the rights of the disabled. Through our study we will challenge one another to put ideas into practice.

ADULT B'NEI MITZVAH CLASS

Instructor: Rabbi Fredi Cooper

The class will begin with an information session that includes a chance to get to know each other, share expectations, hopes and dreams for this ambitious undertaking. This course involves an intensive course of study organized over an 18-month period, in which the necessary skills, information and resources to become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah are taught. For those adults who have not had a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, the formal culmination ceremony will mark this life milestone. Core Courses include The Jewish Life Cycle, Comparative Judaism and Spiritual Pathways: Prayer, Text Study and Halakhah.

These are forms of paper cutting. In this workshop, you will learn how to develop your own design and create a picture.

THE NEXT STEP: INTERMEDIATE JUDAISM

Instructors: Rabbi Leonard Gordon & Jill Levy (JTS Rabbinical Student)

This course is intended for adult learners who have taken a basic Judaism class like Melton Mini-School, Rabbi Fredi Cooper's Adult B'nai Mitzvah Program, or have some general Jewish education and want to move on to the next level of learning. Some Jewish literacy is assumed, but all texts will be studied in English. We will survey select topics in Jewish text, ritual, prayer and life cycle, while leaving time to explore "big issues" in depth. An additional goal is to learn Mishnayot from Tractate Brachot, where students will eventually take turns teaching the Mishnah each week. The class will be interactive and participatory.

ZOHAR II: TORAH THROUGH MYSTICAL EYES

Instructor: Rabbi Adam Zeff

The Torah can be viewed through many lenses, but the view framed through the Zohar, the premier book of Jewish mysticism or *kabbalah*, has challenged, fascinated, and frustrated generations of readers. The Zohar takes us into a world where nothing is as it seems and the light of truth is hidden under layers upon layers of text. Entering into this world is a challenge, but the experience rewards us richly by opening up the words of Torah to a deeper vision of truth. In this class we will examine familiar Torah passages through the mystical lens of Zohar, with particular focus on how these insights may transform our previous understandings of the text. All texts will be studied in translation, and no previous knowledge is necessary.

Explore Jewish afterlife texts spanning over 3000 years of history. As travelers through time we shall enter worlds of Torah, Talmud, Midrash, Zohar and Hasidic tales to investigate the diverse ways Jews have understood the mystery and enigma of afterlife and the world beyond. In searching for contemporary spiritual meaning we shall use these texts for reflection and discussion to discover practical guidelines for our own contemplative questions about afterlife, death and loss—personally, and in our families and communities.

INTRODUCTION TO ISLAM FOR JEWS

Instructor: Professor Hussein Rashid, Hofstra University, Visiting Professor at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College)

Join RRC students for the first three sessions of their course "Introduction to Islam," taught by a guest professor from New York City, Hussein Rashid. Hussein is a scholar with over a decade of experience teaching about Islam in adult education venues. He is a regular faculty member at the Center for Religious Inquiry in Manhattan where "his course evaluations are routinely raves."

Required reading for all participants in the course will be Reuven Firestone's book, *Islam for Jews*. Using the book as background, Professor Rashid will introduce the basics of Islam as a religion, while also sharing his own perspective as a "proud Muslim" on issues such as the Sunni-Shi'ite divide, the challenges of understanding Islam in western terms, gender dynamics among young American Muslims, America's political and military involvement in the Muslim world, how a contemporary Muslim can interpret the Qur'an and more.

PARENT WORKSHOPS

We hold workshops for parents throughout the year led by our rabbis, covering such topics as how to celebrate Shabbat as a family (**Oct 25, 2009**), the connections between winter celebrations in many religions (**Dec 6, 2009**), how to engage young children in the Pesach seder (**Mar 14, 2009**), and how to incorporate ritual moments into your family's everyday life (**Apr 25, 2009**).

These workshops are held on Sunday mornings, and childcare is available (prior registration necessary).

Family & Children's Programming



SHABBAT

Each **Saturday morning** during the school year we offer programming for kids of all ages and their families.

Childcare—for children 6 years and under, childcare is available while parents attend one of our adult prayer services.

Ginat Shabbat—for children 6 years and under and their parents, a special service & Kiddush (refreshments) including bible stories & a puppet show.

Minyan Oranim—for kids in Kindergarten through 2nd grade, a special service including discussion, movement and prayer.

Junior Congregation—for kids in 3rd-7th grade, a self-led service including Torah reading, discussion and song.

Tot Shabbat & Holidays—6 PM

Once a month we celebrate Shabbat on Friday night (or a holiday on an alternate night) with a 30-minute program geared toward pre-schoolers and their families. Program includes prayers, songs, and stories to share the joy of Shabbat together. Followed at 6:30 PM by a potluck dinner for everyone to share, building community among our young families.

On holidays throughout the year, we hold GJC Celebrates! programs for families, when we celebrate the holiday in an age-appropriate way. These celebrations sometimes coincide with adult prayer services and sometimes do not. Whether it's waving a lulav on **Sukkot (Sun. Oct 4)**, marching with Torah scrolls on **Simchat Torah (Sat. Oct 11)**, singing and listening to stories on **Hanukkah (Sat. Dec 12)**, or raucously celebrating **Purim (Sat. Feb 27)**, our GJC Celebrates! programs are highlights of the year for our children.

Adult Ed Instructors

RABBI FREDI COOPER teaches at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College as an adjunct Associate Professor in practical rabbinics. Rabbi Cooper received her ordination from RRC, holds a doctorate from Temple University, and masters degrees in Special Education and Hebrew Letters. She is currently the vice president of Education at GJC.

RABBI LEONARD GORDON has served as Rabbi at GJC since 1994. He chairs the Committee on Social Justice and Public Policy of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism and is a member of the Rabbinical Assembly's committee to create a new Conservative High Holiday Mahzor (due out in 2010). Rabbi Gordon has taught Comparative Religion and Rabbinic Literature at Columbia University, Brown University, Ohio State, and Kenyon College. He was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary in 1985 and holds masters degrees in Religious Studies from Brown and Columbia Universities.

JILL LEVY is a GJC member & fourth year rabbinical student at the Jewish Theological Seminary and a Wexner Graduate Fellow. Jill's work in Jewish education includes teaching adults in congregational settings as well as informal youth education at Camp Ramah and various Hebrew schools. Jill proudly co-authored a study guide to Massekhet HaHammah with Rabbi Gordon. Jill is married to Matthew Silverman, a first year rabbinical student at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College.

DR. SIMCHA RAPHAEL, PH.D. is a GJC member & Adjunct Assistant Professor in Jewish Studies at Temple University, and has a private counseling practice, affiliated with Mount Airy Counseling Center. He is author of the book *Jewish Views of the Afterlife*. Ordained by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi as a Rabbinic Pastor, Simcha is currently in the Rabbinical Ordination program of the Academy for Jewish Religion. His website is www.simcharaphael.com

PROFESSOR HUSSEIN RASHID is a native New Yorker. He graduated from Columbia University in 1996 and earned a Master's in Theological Studies at Harvard Divinity School. He is currently a professor at Hofstra University and is completing his PhD through Harvard's Near Eastern Studies Department. In addition to founding Islamicate and writing regularly for Religion Dispatches, he advises political figures, and appears on various media outlets such as CNN as an expert commentator. He is recognized as one of the young Muslim leaders whose scholarship, community teaching and extensive presence on the internet are helping to shape American Islam in the 21st century.

Adult Ed Instructors

MINDY SHAPIRO is a GJC member who was first introduced to the folk art of paper cutting at KlezKamp, a Yiddish folk camp, during the winter of 1995. She credits her immediate passion for this art form to her only art training which was as a leather craftsperson at Camp Louise. Mindy's groundbreaking creativity, intricate designs and use of color, combined with her wide-ranging Jewish knowledge, distinguish her as an artist. Her original designs are sketched by hand and cut with a knife. In addition to being an artist, Mindy has also worked for 25 years in Jewish education.

RABBI ADAM ZEFF has served the GJC community since 2002, first as Student Rabbi and currently as Assistant Rabbi. In addition to his other responsibilities, he enjoys bringing music and storytelling into his rabbinic work at GJC. Rabbi Zeff holds a B.A. in Anthropology from Yale University and a Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University of Pennsylvania.
