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Leadership

Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakkai taught: If you have a sapling in your hand, and someone says to you that the Messiah has come, stay and complete the planting, and then go to greet the Messiah. (Avot d'Rabbi Natan 31b)

In November, Executive Director Nina Peskin and I spent five days in Evanston, Illinois as part of the 2010 Class of the Kellogg Management Education for Jewish Leaders (KJL) Program at Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management. The program brought together 79 Jewish leaders, including 50 rabbis and 26 synagogue executive directors. Participants came from the Reform, Conservative, and Orthodox movements, and they lead Jewish organizations in 19 states, Canada and the United Kingdom.

All of these busy people came to the Evanston campus to learn state-of-the-art professional leadership and management skills, taught by senior members of the Kellogg School faculty. Of course, the learning didn't stop at the doors of the classroom. Spending those days together with other Jewish leaders from other parts of the Jewish world - from Federations to Chabad Houses – gave us the opportunity to learn from each other, seeing how much we share in the challenges we face and the strategies we can use to meet them. Nina and I hope to put much of that learning into practice in our work at GJC in the months ahead.

For now, I wanted to share one piece of learning that made a particular impression on me, something I connect to the teaching above from Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakkai. Our teachers at KJL taught us that in all of the challenges that we face, both as individuals and as leaders, our central task is to stay focused on our mission. Why are we doing what we are doing? What are our core values? How can we embody those values in our actions, now and in the future?

For ben Zakkai, the mission is clear, and he stays focused. As a teacher, he is planting saplings, nourishing students whose growth and development will change the world and bring it closer to God. Messianic talk promises an end run around that process, a short-cut to redeeming the world. But ben Zakkai knows there are no short-cuts. The world will not be redeemed in an instant, as if by magic, but only by doing the hard work of planting for the future.

In the transition process that we are now going through at GJC, we are doing some of that hard work, planting for the future. We are asking the same questions: Why do we do what we do? What are GJC's core values? How do we shape our institution so as to embody those values, now and in the years to come? As ben Zakkai teaches us, there are no short-cuts. I encourage each of us to roll up our sleeves and engage in this work together, planting the seeds of growth that will nourish us all.

President's Message

"A community of communities"

This is not just a slogan. It is how many of us perceive our con-

gregation, and it appears to be how many on the outside perceive us as a group. We pride ourselves on our diversity, but diversity can be a double-edged sword. Our "community of communities" can be our greatest strength or it can become a wedge that divides us. While I think we have long been moving in the right direction, we should not just take it—and each other—for granted. We must consider how best to capitalize on our diversity to make it an asset, not a liability, to the larger GJC community.

The strength which our "community of communities" brings to us is enormous. It enables us to provide many pathways to membership -- through ECP, Hazak, Men's and Women's Clubs, Social Action or our diverse prayer services for starters. It allows all of us to experience new and different ways of doing things,

which we can adopt permanently, adapt, or just try once before returning to our own comfort zones. Diversity challenges us to provide varied programming in which we genuinely engage with and learn from each other rather than simply hearing our own viewpoints reiterated. It provides individuals with the opportunity to move from sub-community to sub-community as their own needs change throughout their lives. But we must never lose sight of the fact that we are one - a single, unified community, not just a collection of disconnected groups. Our diversity becomes a weakness when we forget this fundamental point-when we become "silos" or, worse yet, competitors. It is important to celebrate and embrace the uniqueness of our individual communities, but we must also remember that we are all part of a larger single commu-

Where does this all take us? The lay leadership at GJC is considering how best to incorporate the positives

of our "community of communities" into all that we do. For example, the Program Committee now consists of representatives from many of our sub-communities to encourage cross-pollination of ideas and cosponsorships of programs. Our new Chesed Committee is working on a cross-generational, cross-community group cooking project to provide meals for any GJC member who has suffered a loss, is enduring an illness or has welcomed a new member to the family. We are also in the process of discussing how to approach Israel programming in a way that acknowledges multiple points of view and reflects the heterogeneous congregation that we

Being part of a diverse community clearly has the potential to enrich our lives. I hope we will all take some time to reflect on the concept of a "community of communities" and how we can each contribute to making it the strength that we know it can be.

Jill Levy and Matt Silverman, who married in 2007, have grown into their Judaism. Jill, 35, is the student rabbi at GJC and is in her last year at the Jewish Theological Seminary. Matt, 31, is a third year student at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College.

Jill was born in Plainfield, NJ but moved to Houston at age two and has always identified as a Texan. Her father grew up in the Strawberry Mansion neighborhood of Philadelphia, but said he always wanted to live in Texas.

"My parents have always been strongly identified as Jews and have very few friends who aren't Jewish, but we were the quintessential twice-a-year Jews," Jill says. They didn't have a Friday night meal, but occasionally went to her aunt and uncle's house for Shabbat dinner. "It wasn't until I went to college at the University of Washington in Seattle and got engaged with Hillel that I really began to explore my Jewish identity and Jewish practice," she recalls.

In college, Jill majored in biology. After college, she went back to Texas for a year, then spent two years in Israel studying at the Pardes Institute of Jewish Studies. When she came home she earned her MPA (Master of Public Administration) degree with a concentration in environmental policy from Columbia University. She initially worked as an environmental consultant helping to develop properties, but she didn't feel fulfilled. She felt more satisfaction in volunteering for the havurah she attended and realized that she wanted to work in the Jewish community.

Initially, Jill moved to Atlanta to work for Birthright Israel, which provides first-time trips to Israel for young adults. Her job was "to find Birthright alums and get them involved in the local Jewish community," she recalls. "It was great, really exciting." She chose Atlanta where a community of people from Pardes had settled. "I wanted to get out of New York. I had a really, really tiny apartment that I paid a million dollars for. In Atlanta I had 5 closets." Jill moved to Atlanta and took a job "that made me feel – that made me know - I wanted to be a rabbi."

Atlanta was where Jill and Matt met, while both were working for Hillel. They now have a daughter, Nava, who is 17 months old.

Matt was born in Fairfax County, Northern Virginia, and grew up there. He attended James Madison University, majoring in economics and religion. He then enrolled at Emory University's Candler School of Theology, where he was the only identified Jew studying for a Masters of Theological Studies among 600 students, mostly Protestants, studying for divinity degrees.

"I wasn't so connected to the Jewish community," he recalls. "I had a typical Reform upbringing. I went to Hebrew School, had a bar mitzvah, and even did a year of Hebrew School after my bar mitzvah. My mom taught second grade in Hebrew School, so we were somewhat connected. I couldn't eat bread on Passover." He laughs.

"I think I had one Jewish friend growing up," he says. "And in graduate school, all my friends were becoming ministers. I was living entirely in secular society. I wasn't connected with Hillel or the larger Jewish community while I was there."

Matt graduated from Candler in 2003. "It was a hard time to find a job. What do you do with a Masters in Theological Studies?" he says. "I used Judaism as a niche and worked with Jewish Family and Career Services while searching for a job. I found out about the Hillel position [and worked there] as an office manager. Then Jill applied to JTS, and I applied to Fordham. We were in New York for one year. Then we went to Israel for the year for JTS, and when we came back, I started at RRC."

"I remember thinking when I was in college that I couldn't study Judaism for four years in rabbinical school – I didn't know it was five or six years. But as I learned more about Judaism and studied the texts and the pastoral aspects, I thought, there's so much more to learn."

Jill and Matt moved to Philadelphia in 2008, so Matt could spend his first year in the Mechina program – getting his modern and biblical Hebrew up to speed – and taking general classes on Jewish studies. Now Matt is in his third year of a six year rabbinical school program.

Jill's role as GJC's student rabbi is varied. "I get to do a lot of great things," she says. "A big part of what I do is pastoral work, visiting people who are sick or homebound or calling people who have loved ones on the mishaberach list and checking in with them." Then there are the more visible things, mostly in the Charry. She delivers a commentary on the Torah portion, leads the Sunday morning minyan, "one of the spaces where people come together from all the minyanim," she observes. She also is helping to get the Kesher program started to bring aid and comfort to GJC families in need. Jill also leads classes in Adult Education and will teach a text based course in January called "Mishnah Megillah," which fits in with the synagogue's broad theme for the year: text study. "Last fall I taught a class on the Akedah. I assist Adam, go to different committee meetings, all sorts of different synagogue things."

Whew.

"Because Jill is working so much more, I'm taking care of Nava," Matt says. "She's moving around a lot more now. The first year you could just put her in a swing and read for classes. This year she wants to get into the kitchen. She wants to go up the stairs. She wants to sit in my lap and play games. Jill adds, "He's taking double the number of classes I am. I'm down to three classes a semester. Matt is taking six."

Jill sums up her experience at GJC: "It's been nice for me to get to know the

"You'll need your hat, 1.5 liters of water, and your study materials!"

It's time for class, but there is no classroom or desks or chairs. Instead the sun is shining, the view is incredible, and it's time for another tiyul (trip) in Eretz Yisrael.

This is a typical day on the Alexander Muss Program. The Core class—the Israel curriculum—is no ordinary class, rather the classroom is all over the country, the notes are facts dear to your heart, and the

teachers are like your family. The curriculum covers the land of Israel and Judaism from the Biblical period through modern day. We learned in Jerusalem, hiked the Gilboa, played in sand dunes in the Negev, climbed on tanks from the War of Independence at Latrune, interviewed Israelis on the streets in Tel-Aviv, went to the most northern kibbutz in Israel that overlooks Lebanon, and had class in so many locations that it didn't really seem like a class at all—but the experience of our lives.

Muss wasn't only class though. One of the most challenging and rewarding experiences was Yam Le Yam—a four day hike across Israel from the Mediterranean Sea to the

Kinneret. We learned that in order to accomplish our goals we needed to help one another—such as holding someone's hand as we rock climbed down a mountain, grabbing someone as they teetered towards the edge of a cliff, and providing moral support for each other, even in the most trying circumstances. The latter was most definitely the most important partthe part that enabled all forty-three of us to finish the hike. We learned that helping each other and trusting each other would not only be vital to finishing the hike, but for the entirety of the Muss experience as well. We would go through the best times of our lives and sometimes the toughest times, and we would need the sup-

GJC Social Action Committee Addresses the Marcellus Shale

Many of you have already heard about the Marcellus Shale, which spans two thirds of our state and is considered to be the Saudi Arabia of natural gas. Much of the PA State Legislature has staked the economic future of the State on the successful extraction of the natural gas, which until recently was not an economically viable undertaking. Drilling advancements in the process known as "fracking" have made accessing the natural gas much easier, and now, we are in the midst of a modern-day gold rush across the State with the exception of the southwestern area that includes Philadelphia. As with the California gold rush, there have been numerous accusations that some mining companies are not paying sufficient attention to safety environmental integrity. and Simultaneously, local governments and State agencies such as the Department of Environmental Protection have been criticized for not doing everything they can to ensure safety and environmental protection. Also in question is the future safety of our drinking water if drilling around the Delaware River Basin adversely affects the water supply of 17 million people in Philadelphia, New York and New

The extraction of natural gas from

the Marcellus Shale is an important issue to all of us, and if handled badly – without careful deliberation and attention to safety and the environment – could become one of the key environmental problems for Pennsylvanians over the next decade. The GJC Social Action Committee, therefore,

has decided to look carefully into what is going on in the Marcellus Shale and do what we can to encourage transparency, accountability and environmental protection. Some of our partner Neighborhood Interfaith Movement congregations have also expressed interest in this effort, and we have reached out to the Damascus Citizens for Sustainability as a potential partner.

We have only just begun our involvement but wanted to bring to everyone's attention what is going on and what is at stake. We begin with several questions.

- What is the estimated economic gain to PA from the Marcellus Shale over the next 10 years?
- How long can the shale sustain this rate of extraction before the supply is depleted?
- What do Pennsylvania residents stand to gain?
- What is the estimated cost to the environment over the next 10 years?
 - What are other risks involved?
- What problems have already arisen and how have state agencies such as the DEP responded?
- How have companies responded to unexpected problems?
- Have water supplies been affected by fracking?

port of each other to get through it.

Another challenging experience was Gadna. Gadna was our chance to truly sample what it might be like to be in the Israeli army (Tzahal). We dressed in uniform, lived in tents, and obeyed the demands of our commanders, such as "10 seconds to run to that tree" or "fifteen seconds to stand in two lines in front of the Cheder Ochel. Move!" We learned the importance of being on time and following orders, but mostly we learned about the army. During one class session there, we learned about the various units of Tzahal, and we had many sessions on how to properly shoot a rifle, which we did on the final day of Gadna.

Muss also gave us the opportunity to meet new people and reconnect with family and friends in Israel. We Barrack students shared the campus with Israelis, but also with kids from the Gann School in Boston, AHA (American Hebrew Academy) of North Carolina, and eventually with Australians who all were on the Muss Program as well. A small group of us who are part of the youth movement Habonim Dror attended a ken (gathering) of Israeli teens who belong to Habonim Dror's sister movement in Israel, Hanoar Haoved. Finally, while the Muss kids were usually all together on the weekends, there were a few weekends that we could spend at the place of our choosing. During those weekends, many of us reconnected with our families, relatives whom we only rarely get to see.

I think all forty-three of us can agree that Muss was an incredible experience. I, personally, have never felt so informed about our homeland, and the bonds we formed with each other are sure to continue growing stronger throughout the rest of high school.

Finance

This is the first in a series of columns designed to help GJC members better understand shul finances. I hope that greater transparency will make members see the need for contributions above and beyond dues and feel good about how their money is being spent. Finances should not be a "black box."

This month I will begin with the Building Fund. The Building Fund is separate and apart from the Women's Club Building Beautiful Household members are billed \$360 for the Building Fund. Individual members are billed \$180 and associate individual members are billed \$90. Those on adjusted dues are not billed for the Building Fund at all, although we welcome contributions to it. The Building Fund was created around 2001. At that time, we found that approximately \$300,000 to \$500,000 in improvements to the School build-

ing were necessary above and beyond the funds raised by the 60th anniversary capital campaign. Those improvements were covered in large part by a loan from The Reinvestment Fund. This loan has a balloon payment of approximately \$241,937 in 2013, and we are currently exploring possibilities about how to handle it.

The Building Fund was envisioned to raise the funds necessary to pay down this debt. At the same time, we recognized that many, if not most, synagogues have a building fund to cover extraordinary capital expenditures that cannot be covered or anticipated in an annual budget—just as you may set aside (or hope to set aside!) funds in case your furnace goes kaput or you need a new roof. Today we raise approximately \$75,000 a year through the Building Fund. We use approximately one-half of it to retire the TRF debt acquired in 2001. We accumulate the balance towards "big ticket" expenditures. In recent years we have used this fund to replace the chiller (\$102,000), to replace an oil tank (\$15,700) and for facade repairs and stabilization (\$44,000). Upcoming likely expenditures include replacing the flat roof over the Charry Sanctuary with a roof that has a pitch to it.

Many people believe the Building Fund is "voluntary." It is not, just as replacing the roof is neither "optional" nor cost-free. It is, of course, our policy not to turn away members who cannot shoulder the full financial commitment we request. Thus, not all members contribute to this Fund. I hope that with this additional explanation you will see the critical need for a Building Fund to maintain our physical plant and will contribute to it to the extent your finances permit.

GJC's New Trees

Seven new trees beautify the GJC Slandscape adjacent to the preschool playground thanks to volunteers from the Centre and the West Mount Airy Neighbors Streetscape Committee. On Sunday November 21st the group gathered to plant 3 bald cypresses, 3 red maples, and one flowering cherry selected and provided free of charge by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's Tree Vitalize program.




