Carving Out Your *Own* "Palace in Time"

t a Shabbat evening service recently I

shared a story about a friend of mine. Each week, since she was a baby, her parents had placed their hands on her head, and offered a blessing for her at the Shabbat dinner table. As she grew up, there was never a Friday night at which her parents had not performed this ritual. In middle school, my friend went off to summer camp for the first time. After several days of seemingly endless fun, anxiety began to set in - Friday night was approaching, and she realized that her parents would not be there to bless her! As the day's activities ended, and she and her cabin-mates returned to their bunk to prepare for Shabbat, my friend shared her fears with her counselor, who tried her best to assuage them. She ensured the concerned camper that Shabbat at camp was a different, but equally special experience, and suggested that she write a letter home to her parents sharing her wishes for the new week as a sort of alternative blessing - but nothing seemed to help, the girl's anxiety level continued to rise. Just then, as her bunk was preparing to leave and join the rest of the camp for Kabbalat Shabbat, the assistant camp director entered the cabin with a sheet of paper. "An urgent fax had just arrived," he said as he handed the sheet of paper to my friend. On the sheet was a photo copy of two pairs of hands, and the words of the priestly blessing. As she held the sheet of paper over her head, she finally felt ready to enter Shabbat.

Jewish tradition teaches us that Shabbat is a special time when we are to take the opportunity to emulate God's divine rest at the end of the six days of creation. We are commanded to refrain from *melacha* (work), sanctify the day as *kodesh* (*holy* or *set apart*), and find oneg (delight) in it. But what does that actually mean? How do we do that in our lives? As the personal, professional, and social demands on our time pile up, and the boundary between the work week and the weekend becomes more and more blurred by the SmartPhone era, how are we, as 21st century Jews to apply and take seriously the Jewish imperative to *shamor v'zachor* (guard and remember) the Sabbath day? How are we supposed to fit vet another thing into our busy schedules – especially a thing that lasts 25 hours?!

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel offers us a useful lens for engaging with this seeming dilemma of Shabbat. He suggests that, "The seventh day is like a palace in time with a kingdom for all. It is not a date but an atmosphere. It is not a different state of consciousness but a different climate; it is as if the appearance of all things somehow changed. The primary awareness is one of our being within the Sabbath rather than the Sabbath being within us." If we think of Shabbat, as Heschel suggests, as a palace in time, then it stops being something that we have to make space for in our Day-Planners, Blackberries, and Google Calendars, and instead something that lets us escape from all that - it becomes a sort of spiritual

vacation home - a weekly 25-hour retreat from the craziness of our daily lives.

There is no one-size-fits all model for Shabbat. None of us carves out our or our family's time in exactly the same way - so why should the temporal palace we build for ourselves look the same as our neighbors? Like any good DIY project, there are lots of resources out there to help each of us craft the Shabbat that is right for us and our family. On the internet, blog's abound! One of my favorites,

Why We Belong

n the transition survey that we conducted last year, 90.8% of

respondents cited "belonging to a community" as one of the reasons for their membership. This was in fact the most frequently cited reason (followed by "spiritual or religious fulfillment" at 79.3%). This is probably not a particularly startling result. In a world that has become increasingly impersonal and harsh, many of us look for a place where we "belong."

At Germantown Jewish Centre we pride ourselves in our diversity and in the multiple gateways to connection that we try to create. For those of you who are not regular shulgoers, I encourage you to give Shabbat or holiday services a try. As most of you know, on Shabbat morning we generally have three different services to choose from and we have recently added a once-a-month fourth service - Kol D'mamah - a more reflective and meditative option. But I also recognize that for many, services are not the way to connect. What other ways can you either connect to the GJC communi-

• Volunteer to help out at one of our many activities during the year. You can help sort clothes for the annual women's clothing exchange or help decorate for the Purim bash. If your tastes or skills are more engineering-oriented, help install the Hannukiyah. If you are a budding chef, we can use you to prepare meals for our Chesed Program. If you just have an hour or two here and there, we often need volunteers to take those meals to a family suffering a loss or celebrating a birth. And we also have special programs with our neighborhood Henry School.

• Take an adult education course. Better yet, volunteer to teach one. Whatever your skill or knowledge base, we generally have plenty of willing students. Over the years we have had an enticing array, from Jewish folk tales to Midrash to cooking.

• Invite a new family to Shabbat dinner or to a special holiday service. Another piece of learning from our transition survey is that people who do not connect quickly (within

sabbathmanifesto.org/), "a creative project designed to slow down lives in an increasingly hectic world." Sabbath Manifesto is also the sponsor of the 3rd annual *National Day of Unplugging* (March 23-24, 2012). And, although not yet one myself, **The Modern Jewish Mom's Guide to Shabbat** (by Meredith L. Jacobs) is a great (and engaging) offline read for dads and moms alike!

At GJC, we strive to help each person create his or her own palace in time by offering a range of options for Shabbat worship and gathering. Over the past year, these have expanded to include our *Kol D'mamah* contemplative service, *Kol Zimrah* musical the first one or two years) often leave the community. We are always looking for longer-term members willing to help our newer members connect in a way that is meaningful to them. That first step is often just a one-onone connection over food.

• Attend a shiva minyan. We often overlook the importance of this simple but profound act of caring. You don't have to be the best friend of the bereaved to make a difference at these most difficult of times.

• Attend the programs or activities offered by our auxiliaries or committees. Men's Club, Women's Club, Hazak and our Social Action Committee all offer exciting programs throughout the year. Some are educational ("Thinking the Unthinkable," "Managing Stress" or a viewing of "Gasland"), some are service-oriented (blood drive) and others are just fun ("Opera Under the Stars" or the Men's Club annual Camden River Sharks outing). Some are a combination (Hazak book group). But they all offer the opportunity to get together with a great group of people.

The possibilities are endless and the rewards are great.

Adina Abramowitz and Naomi Klayman are active members and leaders of Dorshei Derekh, which they began attending in 2005. Founding members of congregation Mishkan Shalom in 1988, they migrated to GJC when their daughter, Esther Wiesner, was engaged to Toby Kessler. After trying it out for a while, they realized they enjoyed the more traditional service at Dorshei. They joined Dorshei in 2006 and GJC in 2007.

Naomi, 64, was born in Queens, NY and grew up in a culturally Jewish home. She attended Queens College, got married, and later moved to Media, PA in 1976. After her children were all in school, she got divorced and completed her master's degree from the Annenberg School of Communications at U Penn. She started working in general marketing research for nine years, until she started specializing in the pharmaceutical sector.

Adina, 53, was born in Brooklyn and moved at age four to Silver Spring MD. Her parents still live in the house they bought in 1964. She attended the Hebrew Academy of Washington, a Modern Orthodox day school and Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School. At Barnard College, she took classes at the Jewish Theological Seminary and spent her junior year abroad at Hebrew University.

Adina moved to Philadelphia to study at the School of Public Policy at Penn where she met fellow stu-

dent Michael Masch, a Germantown Minyan founder and Dorshei regular. She moved to Mt. Airy in 1981 and went to the Germantown Minyan until 1983, when the two minyanim were still joined together. She then became involved with P'nai Or and met Naomi in 1988 at the first meeting to organize a new congregation, Mishkan Shalom.

"I had decided I was tired of the havurah approach that was reinventing everything from scratch," Adina recalls, "and I thought, 'Let's pay a rabbi to do some of these things.'"

In the meantime, Naomi had become a member of Beth Israel and joined with the families who banded together to join a new synagogue when Rabbi Brian Walt left that synagogue.

At the very first meeting, Adina met Naomi. "It was love at first sight," they agree. "It didn't take very long before we were serious and then living together and deeply involved with organizing Mishkan Shalom," Adina says. "We shared the vision of Mishkan's social justice commitment and we wanted to be part of a diverse community. At the same time, I was becoming a stepparent.

At the time they got together, Naomi's daughter, Esther, was 16, Jeff was 14, and Shoshanna, now on GJC's staff, was 11.

"We were very lucky in that the kids and I liked each other from the beginning. I always wanted to be a parent. I just didn't know exactly how it was going to happen."

For six years, they lived in Media. "I never met anybody I knew out in the street or in a store," Adina says. "The day we moved to Mt. Airy in 1995, I went to the Wawa to get cold drinks for the movers, and I made some comment to some African American man in front of me and we struck up a conversation. I'd never had a conversation of mixed race in Media."

Mt. Airy was a revelation to Naomi. "The first Saturday," she recalls, "we saw someone walking to shul wearing his tallit, we saw a Krishna woman in her robes, and then the next day, a Christian man walking and doing the rosary. Adina said she'd hired those people to impress me with the diversity."

On the other hand, their expectations of no longer having to dig their long driveway in Media out from the snow were adjusted when they experienced their first three-foot snowstorm in Mt. Airy. They had to dig out the entire street because the snowplows never showed up. On the bright side, all their neighbors cooperated in digging out – one of the many signs that they were truly in a new kind of community.

"Once Esther and Toby became engaged, we started visiting Dorshei and checking it out," Naomi recalls. "I don't think I was ready for it at the time we joined Mishkan, but over the years I wanted something more traditional, services with more Hebrew and more straight-on davening."

"It was easier for me to be shomer shabbas, to the extent we are, because the Dorshei community was doing that consistently," Adina says. "We started doing it for 24 hours not just when we were in services, so we felt a deepening of our commitment to Shabbat, having Friday night dinner and not doing errands on Saturdays the way we used to do. Naomi points out that it changed her sense of time, with the week revolving around Shabbat rather than around work.

Adina notes, "The assumption is that on Saturday morning you're going to shul, not that you're thinking about it. It's like going to the gym. If you're thinking about it you probably won't go. We attend much more consistently." For the past three years, Adina has been coordinator of high-holiday services. "It's time lim-

ited and I like the stage management component of making services happen and bringing together all the skills and abilities of the people at Dorshei.," Beginning last fall, Adina became the d'var torah coordinator. "It's the easiest job at Dorshei," she says, "because so many people have wisdom to share."

In her weekday life, Adina runs a business consulting called Consulting for Change. "I work with Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs) and provide strategic planning and management consulting," she says. "I've been in this field for 25 years." From 1996 to the end of 2005, Adina worked at the Opportunity Finance Network, the national organization of CDFIs based in Philadelphia, first as the director of consulting and training and then as the chief operating officer for two years. Since 2006 she has been in business for herself. "Last year was my busiest year ever," Adina says, "because of policies President Obama has put in place. The banking crisis has helped CDFIs because banks aren't lending so much and we're a recognized part of the economic system in a way we weren't before Obama."

Naomi's current career in qualitative marketing research and consulting for the pharmaceutical industry grew out of her responsibilities conducting patient satisfaction research for an HMO. She became interested in physician-patient communication and decided to pursue a doctoral degree in 1993. "Although I had intended to teach in medical residency programs and continue doing academic research, through a series unexpected circumstances I of ended up back in qualitative marketing research in the field of pharmaceuticals," Naomi says. She worked for consulting firms for 10 years and then went into business for herself in 2005. "I help pharmaceutical companies learn how to position their products and communicate the

proper use of their products most effectively to their constituencies: doctors, patients and caregivers, ancillary health care providers, and managed care directors," Naomi explains, for example, she tests names proposed for new drugs. "With the advent of global marketing you need to go to each country and find out how that name takes on meaning when used in each culture," she says. "What sounds motivating in the U.S. might communicate a sense of danger in another country." Hence, many plane rides. Because drug patents run out quickly, her schedules are always tight and require quick delivery. Her greatest enjoyment at work is when she is able to establish a close relationship either with respondents or with the marketing research and marketing teams. She points out, "I feel there is a spiritual component to providing a space where people can truly be heard and their challenges appreciated."

Both Adina and Naomi work out of their house. "I either commute by walking down the hall or I get on an airplane," Naomi says.

At Dorshei, Naomi was Kiddush coordinator for a year and was the minvan coordinator last year. "I helped the community institute changes that made them more organized," she says. "We expanded the coordinator term from six months to one year. Several people who'd done the job felt they were just beginning to work with the community when their term was up. A year term is less disruptive and it is also easier on GIC staff when we don't shift leadership so often. We also started preserving institutional memory by writing up the responsibilities for each of the coordinator positions. Now when we ask people to volunteer, they know exactly what they would be committing to and that there are some reasonable limits to the scope of the job.

"Criticisms and suggestions for improvement are given thoughtfully and carefully in private and praise is given in public," Naomi observes of Dorshei. "I've really learned how to be a better person working with them: being patient with other people and talking in the way that make other people want to do things instead of saying 'No that won't work.' I think it's changed the way I treat my clients."

Naomi and Adina are dedicated grandparents to Mikaela, 3 ¹/₂ and Leora, 2. Each week they share Thursday night dinners. "We are grateful to live so close to all our adult children," they comment. They recently became avid bicyclists and have begun to use their bicycles, instead of their car, to do errands.

Adina says that the high point of her Jewish experience was being selected to the Reconstructionist Prayer Book Commission, the first time in Jewish history when rabbis and lay people created a prayer book together. She also has joined the board of Hazon, the Jewish environmental group, as its new treasurer. Adina is a member of the GJC leadership development committee, led by Josh Goldblum.

Meanwhile, Naomi continues her leadership at Dorshei. "I'm firmly committed to promoting the understanding that Dorshei is part of the larger GJC community," Naomi says. "It's an important part of who we are, as a minyan."

Thanks to the commitment and caring of its phenomenal members, Germantown Jewish Centre's 2011-2012 High Holiday Appeal has been declared a resounding success.

As many know, the High Holiday Appeal is the single largest fundraiser of the year, contributing nearly fifteen percent of the synagogue's annual operating budget.

This year, we set a target goal that the Appeal would raise \$185,000. However, because so many members of our community turned in their cards on Kol Nidre, our Executive Committee was able to further expand their outreach to additional GJC families, who also pledged their support.

With these new contributors, as well as our long-standing contributors increasing their donations, the Appeal already has raised a record of nearly \$196,000. The increase is a remarkable testament to our members' generosity and to our collective commitment to the shul. Additionally, 12 new households have made the decision to become Rosh Pinah members this year, joining our long-standing Rosh Pinah members in making a substantially increased commitment. The new Rosh Pinah total, at the increased donation level, is 24 families.

The increased revenue generated by the successful High Holiday Appeal and the many Rosh Pinah members goes a considerable way towards stabilizing our finances, but leaves work to be done, as we will need to repeat these results to sustain the quality of programming and services we depend on from our synagogue.

Purim Mishloah Manot Tzedakah Project

Shavuot Memorial Plague Dedication

hroughout the ages, Jews have responded to the loss of loved ones by committing themselves to remembering those who have died and to perpetuating their memories through devotion to the values that they held dear in life. Memory, that most insubstantial of experiences, is in fact the thing that stays with us the longest; it is truly our most lasting possession. The customs of mourning – including the recitation of the kaddish prayer, the observance of yahrtzeit on the yearly anniversary of a death, and the yizkor memorial service on holidays - are all intended to help us keep the memories of those whom we have loved and lost alive in our hearts and in our lives.

In medieval times, people began inscribing the names of those who had died on the walls of their synagogues so that they would be remembered by succeeding generations. This custom, which grew out of the losses of the Crusades and other hard times for the Jewish people, finds its modern counterpart in the memorial plaques that hang on the walls of the Charry Sanctuary. The names on these plaques, dear to so many of us, serve as a reminder of those who have come before us and the many blessings they have passed on to us. The lights beside their names are lit on the week of the vahrtzeit and at the vizkor memorial service on holidays as a mark of love and respect.

Please consider adding the name of a loved one to those on our memorial plaques. We will hold a dedication ceremony for the new plaques on Shavuot (Monday, May 28, 2012) when we remember the encounter of the people with God at Mt. Sinai. As we stretch our minds back to that moment, we encompass all of the generations that have lived between then and now, as we continue to uphold the values of their lives in our own time.


Kids' Stuff Giveaway


