usually think of the Charry Sanctuary as a place where our sacred objects are kept and liturgical rituals are performed. On the first Tuesday of October, however, the Charry was transformed from sanctuary as sacred space to sanctuary as refuge when we gathered together for the first meeting of "Refuat HaNefesh," (Healing of the Spirit) our new monthly healing service.

We came to the service for various reasons. Some of us are caregivers; some are working to mend relationships that have long been broken. Some of us are suffering from exhaustion and worry, and some just appreciate having the space to take a step back from the everyday to breathe. Although the circumstances of our lives are varied, we were able to create a container of sacred space where we

Personally, this service felt like a real departure from my previous pastoral work. Two summers ago, I did a 400-hour chaplaincy rotation at a large hospital in Houston. One memory stands out - the night I sat with a man as he passed away after being taken off of a respirator. What was unusual was that his doctor decided to wait with us. It was an intense situation for three strangers to be in together. I asked the doctor how he typically decompresses after nights like these. He responded, " I go home, have a drink, and play video games." I felt a bit sad because while this is one form of decompression, this doctor was not necessarily addressing the emotions that come with his line of work. In that moment I realized that I did not know if anyone I encountered in the hospital sought support once they were outside. For me, the Refuat HaNefesh healing service at GJC is the opportunity for people to seek self-care in the midst of everyday life.

The one hour service consists of singing, brief meditation, personal sharing for those who desire it, text study, and short prayer. It is lead by me, Rabbi Zeff, and Rabbi Melissa Klein. We hope that you will join us.

President's Message

Say Yes!

The holidays are now behind us and all the hard work that our pro-

fessional staff and lay volunteers put in over the summer has yielded a healthy harvest of active programming. In my High Holiday appeal I spoke about how we all get different things from this community and the importance of creating different gateways to it. We are fortunate to have such a vibrant community that offers so many different ways to participate.

You should all have received our lewish Connections brochure that details our many adult education programs ranging from Jewish text studies to cooking to yoga to calligraphy. If you need another copy, they are available in the office or around the shul. We also have active auxiliaries such as Men's and Women's Clubs and Hazak for those over 55. Talk to Bev Sommerson or Judy Schwartz about getting involved with Women's Club, Ken Weiss or Rod Griffith about Men's Club or Cherie Goren or Sonia Dishler about Hazak. Please remember that the programs that these groups offer are open to all! Another way to get involved is to join one of our committees. If social action interests you, Maxine Margolies or Sharon Webber can help you find a way to do some good. Rabbi Fredi Cooper is heading up the Chesed Committee which is developing a program to cook meals for those celebrating a birth, dealing with illness or mourning a loss. Or call Steve Corsover or Gina Michaels, who chair the House & Design Committee, if you have some architectural, engineering or design skills.

But you don't have to put in a lot of time to help build our community. A wonderful thing happened over the summer - we welcomed a large number of new members and our "census" now stands at 528 "units." This is the highest it has been in my five years on the Executive Committee. Many people say that their first contacts with the shul are the most memorable. You can play an important role in that process by volunteering with Nina Peskin to be a Shabbat usher who welcomes new or prospective members to the shul. Or on your own, if you see new faces, welcome them warmly, introduce them to others or ask them to participate in some activity. Places like GJC don't just happen-they require the work of us all to flourish as we have.

I have specifically avoided the "T" word so far but I want to say a few words about the transitions we are going through. When Rabbi Gordon announced that he was leaving last year, Howard Treatman and I conveyed our view that the congregation was in a strong position for making this important transition. I still believe that to be true and I think that the things I have pointed out above bear this out. The Transition Committee has been working over the summer to create a process by which the entire community will have input into envisioning our future. You will soon receive (or, depending on press time, you may have already received) a short on-line questionnaire seeking information that will help us assess how we want to move forward. We anticipate that this questionnaire will be followed with focus groups where we will be able to explore everyone's feelings in greater depth. Please take a few moments to complete the questionnaire. The input of all is valued.

Another transition has taken place with our Executive Director position.

As most of you know, Rachel Gross left us on October 31. Rachel was an extraordinarily dedicated member of this community and we are stronger for her presence these last 14-1/2 years. I am happy to welcome Nina Peskin as our Interim Executive Director. Many of you experienced one of Nina's great talents - her beautiful voice - over the High Holidays. Nina has been with us for five months, working closely with Rachel, and seemed like an obvious choice to serve on an interim basis while we determine how best to fill Rachel's position going forward. Nina has an infectious enthusiasm and may well be contacting some of you to volunteer in various capacities. Help us continue to grow by saying "yes."

Member Spotlight

ne of the more touching stories that Rabbi Leonard Gordon shared from the bimah a few years ago was an incident during the period when he traveled frequently up and back to New York City to visit his ailing father. It was a very hard time for him. One day, Elaine Dushoff said to him, "I'm going to New York, too. Maybe we can ride the train together." When they arrived at Penn Station, Rabbi Gordon asked Elaine what she was doing in NY for the day and she answered, "I just wanted to keep you company. I'm going back to Philadelphia."

That act of loving-kindness describes Elaine Dushoff. Her sidekick and husband, Lee, is clearly proud of her as he rattles off her professional and volunteer accomplishments.

Lee and Elaine and both sets of their parents have a long and proud history at GJC. Both families lived in West Oak Lane and joined Germantown Jewish Centre soon after its founding. Elaine and Lee first met in 1953 at the wedding of Edith Quitman Klausner (of the Quitman library and classrooms.) Elaine was 13 and Lee was 15. Lee remembers their first meeting vividly. "Our twoand-a-half years' age difference in those days was like a generation. I wouldn't date anyone that young; my friends would say I was robbing the cradle."

A few years later, however, their age difference did not seem as large. Lee remembers the exact date of their first date: September 7, 1959. "I was 21 and Elaine was 19. Elaine went out with a young man for seven years whose family was a member of the synagogue and they had decided on the last day of Camp Ramah that they would see other people. They didn't officially break up.

Elaine interjects, "Very serendipitously, Lee's parents and my parents had decided to go to the Cherry Hill Inn. Lee and I sat around the pool and talked together and it was an instant attraction. I never went out with anybody else again and neither did he." (Actually, that's not exactly true as Lee is quick to point out in the kind of familiar and affectionate banter that's lasted almost half a century.) "She'd agreed to go out with her old boyfriend every Saturday night for a month. I said, "You better go home or you'll be late for your date." Elaine finished the story. "Lee was fabulous about it. He'd pick me up and walk me home. He knew I had another date that night."

At the time, Elaine attended Temple University, "because my parents said if I went to Temple I could go to Israel for my junior year. But in my junior year, I got married to Lee instead." They were married in 1961 and Elaine graduated in 1962.

Lee, on the other hand, didn't do well in college. He dropped out of Brandeis after his freshman year and came back to Philadelphia. "I was driving a taxi cab at night so I could go to the race track during the day," Lee says. "My father in law, may he rest in peace, did not see me as a suitable suitor. But my father in law encouraged Elaine to go out with me because I had 'lovely' friends: Doctors, lawyers, engineers. I was the conduit for Elaine to meet other guys. So my father in law was pretty upset that this cab driver wanted to marry his daughter. He had a problem. He couldn't throw me out because our parents were friends." "All the adults loved Lee," Elaine chimed in, "He was always charming, and paid attention to older people in a way most young men didn't."

Lee tells a long and frequently hilarious story about their rocky beginnings. "I asked Elaine to marry me at the end of February of 1960 and Elaine said she'd marry me if I got her father's permission, which I knew was absolutely impossible. We'd gone out on a Saturday night. Sunday I did not call her. I knew there was no point in even thinking about her father allowing me to marry her. So Monday I didn't go to work, and I joined the army.

"So I come out of the army on basic training leave and Elaine was a

counselor at Camp Ramah. My father in law finally gave his permission. But he thought I wouldn't tell anyone about it until after I got out of active duty in six months. I thought he said I wasn't to tell anyone except Elaine." His father in law was furious that Lee had spoken to Elaine about their engagement. All four parents met, there were tears and arguments and finally, Lee's father suggested he just get out of town and return to the army. Outside the house, Lee asked his mother why Elaine's mother had been crying inside. Although she denied it to her dying day, Lee remembers his mother saying, "If my daughter was marrying a bum like you, I'd be crying too.

They were married in June. "My father after that," Elaine says, "you would have thought it was his idea. Lee was so good to her father and her father "absolutely loved Lee." After Lee finished active duty and they got married, Lee and Elaine lived in Philadelphia for a year so Elaine could finish college, then they moved to Boston so that Lee could finish up and graduate from Brandeis University.

Both Elaine's and Lee's mothers served as president of the Women's Club. Lee's father was president of the Men's club and was president of the synagogue.

"In those days, your entire communal life revolved around the synagogue," Lee says. "Nearly all my parents' social friends were members of the synagogue. We've been members of the synagogue all our lives." When he walks into the syna-

gogue today, Lee says, he has "an amazing feeling."

"Elaine has been very active and I have been very inactive," Lee says. "I don't do well in volunteer situations. I heard all the stories when my father was president about all the *mishegas* (craziness) and politics that goes on and I couldn't deal with all of that. But the synagogue gives me a tremendous sense of belonging. I was bar mitzvahed there, I was married there, my son and daughter went to the religious school there and were bar and bat mitzvahed there, my daughter was married there; my father's funeral was there. The sense of security and belonging is what I feel every time I walk into the sanctuary."

Having said all that, Lee does admit that he served for two years as chair of the nominating committee and was the only congregant to speak at Rabbi Sandy Hahn's last Shabbat service, as well as speaking several times from the pulpit.

Elaine's connection runs extremely deep. She began teaching the aleph class at GJC's religious school when she was 16 and continued doing so until she married and moved away. Upon her return from Boston in the 1970s Elaine was made chairperson of the religious school committee and became a member of the synagogue board in her early thirties.

Since then, Elaine's work at GJC has involved numerous committees and projects including representing GJC on the board of the Neighborhood Interfaith Movement (NIM) and encouraging our synagogue to participate with the Interfaith Hospitality network, promoting the work of sheltering guests in rotation with other neighborhood congregations.

Lee explains Elaine's effectiveness this way: "People do not see Elaine as a threat to their own personal agenda. She has influence in the synagogue because she has no interest in having any power. Elaine's affect, which is genuine, made her very influential. They want her on important committees." Elaine helped create the longrange plan, after which Rabbi Gordon was hired. She was chair of the rabbi's evaluation committee five years ago and is now on the transition committee. "We are creating a process to take in feedback from the whole congregation about what kind of rabbi we should be searching for, based on what we as a congregation want to be," Elaine says of that committee.

Meanwhile, Lee started off his professional career working in the restaurant and hotel business with his father and has been doing management consulting work for several decades.

Elaine taught at the Maimonides school, an Orthodox day school in Boston, for the three years while Lee was at Brandeis. To get that job, she had to be interviewed by Rabbi Joseph Soloveitchik, the Rav in Boston at the time. "Luckily, I had no idea who he was when he interviewed me," she laughs.


Their first child, Jonathan, was born within two weeks of returning home to live in Philadelphia. Elaine stayed at home until Franny, their second child, went to first grade. She worked for many years as the Director of Career Services at Rutgers School of Law-Camden.

"I retired when Lee's mother got sick and helped care for her for a year and a half until she died. The dean of the Rutgers law school called me a couple of months later and asked me to apply to be the dean of students." So she "un-retired" and held that post for nearly seven years. Now Elaine works with the Good Shepherd mediation center, mediating mostly divorce and custody issues with couples in Family Court.

Elaine is chair Emerita of the Neighborhood Interfaith Movement (NIM). "It is a 40 year commitment so far," she said. "My pet project at NIM is Dialogue for Racial Justice, which is an interfaith and interracial group of people who devote time to thinking, learning and presenting educational programs about issues of racial justice."

Lee's and Elaine's children are grown, and they have four grandchildren. Jonathan, 45, is a professor of mathematical ecology at McMaster University in Hamilton Ontario. Franny, 43, is a special education teacher with a masters degree in English as a Second Language. Lee and Elaine have been married for 49 years.


