s I write this article, Rebecca and I have just finished putting up our sukkah in the back yard. Following the biblical commandment found in the book of Leviticus, "You will dwell in booths for seven days," this temporary hut will be the place in which our family will eat meals and spend time together for the week-long festival. One of the things that I appreciate most about my time in the sukkah is that this temporary dwelling, open and susceptible to wind and rain, gives me the opportunity to reflect annually on the fragility of life and the ways in which I often take for granted the relative stability of my own life.

The sukkah allows us to step out of the comfortable and the whole and notice the brokenness in our world. As I look up at the stars through the porous roof of the sukkah, I am reminded of the thousands of Philadelphians who are without a permanent roof over their heads each night. As I bring plates of steaming food from my kitchen into the sukkah, I reflect on the wide array of fresh ingredients and access to clean and potable water that enabled our festival meal. As I sit with friends and family in the sukkah, I am aware of the safety of

the community in which I live, free of the fear and violence that plague so many communities both in our country and across the world.

Sukkot is also a time when we are commanded to open our homes (or at least the temporary ones in our backyards) to ushpizin (guests). According to Jewish tradition, in addition to friends, family, and neighbors, we are supposed to invite the spirits of our biblical forefathers and foremothers into the sukkah. Taking this one step further, many have added contemporary role-models and communal heroes (both Jewish and non-Jewish) like Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, Hannah Senesh or Sandy Kaufax to the traditional list of ushpizin. Using sukkot as a time to recall those whose legacy and values inform your own sense of justice can also be a powerful way to mark this fall holiday.

But this process of reflection, recollection, and hospitality cannot begin and end with Sukkot. Rather, our observance of Sukkot should be one of many ways in which our observance of Jewish ritual and practice enhances the way that we live in the world as American citizens and as good and righteous human beings. As Rabbi Zeff remarked in his sermon on Rosh Hashanah.

"We must allow our Judaism – those high Jewish values that we learn from Torah – to challenge the civilization in which we live. Many urgent problems await us: poverty, employment, access to health care, two wars, hunger, the poisoning of our water through "fracking"...To help address these problems as Jews, we must develop in our Jewish life together the motivation, the drive, and the capacity to reach out and influence the world around us."

I invite you all to join me as we continue this conversation on the ways in which our Jewish practice and values can help to shape our commitment to justice at our Charry Weekend on November 18-19th. We are thrilled to welcome Rabbi Steve Gutow, President & CEO of the Jewish Council for Public Affairs (JCPA), as our Scholar-in-Residence as we grapple with the topic, "Repairing the World through Jewish Activism." Steve is a rabbi, a lawyer, and a community organizer whose work through the JCPA as chair of

## How are We Doing?

ow are we doing? This is a question that lurks in the mind

of all lay and professional synagogue leadership. It is hard to know the answer to that question other than anecdotally (we do hear from people from time to time!) or vicariously through membership statistics. We had an opportunity last year to gather some data on that very question for Germantown Jewish Centre. As part of the transition process we undertook a survey to determine what qualities the congregation was looking for in a Senior Rabbi. We had a remarkably good response rate - on the order of 60%. One of the questions on the survey asked the respondent to rate his or her overall with Germantown satisfaction Jewish Centre, from "extremely satisfied" to "not at all satisfied." We were gratified to learn that about 45% of the respondents were "extremely satisfied" and another 45% were "reasonably satisfied." Eight percent were "somewhat satisfied." While survey data have obvious limitations, we took this data as a positive sign given the general propensity for people to speak up

when they are not happy and to remain quiet when they are pleased.

Add to this the fact that our membership remained constant in this year of professional change, and again the signs point in a positive direction. In fact, the majority of the members that we lost over the last year either passed away or moved out of town. And those that we gained tended to be on the younger side (30's and 40's) which bodes well for the future. It was equally exciting, however, that we added one member who was 80+ years old and one who was over 90! We welcome their wisdom as well. Prominent points of entry included ECP and Religious School, Adult Ed classes, as well as the diversity offered by our various minyanim. This suggests that we are moving in the right direction with respect to our missions of promoting diversity and life long learning.

Still the question lurks. Ten percent of those responding —close to 40 respondents—were no better than "somewhat satisfied," scarcely a ringing endorsement. And what about the 40% who did not respond at all? A rosy (but likely wrong) view would be that they are so satisfied—so confident that the leadership will

make the right decision—that they felt no need to respond. Or perhaps they are people who are not particularly involved in the life of the community and did not feel that the decision about rabbinic hiring was one that would effect them. Or perhaps they are not happy at all. We just don't know.

Those who were most satisfied included very recent members (0-2 years) and those who were long-time members (more than 30 years). Least satisfied were those who have belonged for three to five years.

We continue to analyze the data to learn more about the sources of dissatisfaction. We have begun to reach out to some of our members in the 3-5 year category to see if there is something we can do better to maintain the level of satisfaction expressed by more recent (0-2 years) members. But there is no substitute for making your views known. invite those of you who expressed some level of dissatisfaction (or those who did not respond at all but are feeling less than satisfied) to contact me with your concerns. I cannot promise that we will be able to cure your concerns but we cannot even try unless we know what they are!

## GJC's ECP is Chosen as a PJ Library Goes to School Community!

## National program expands to 59 Jewish pre schools in U.S.

The Germantown Jewish Centre's Early Childhood Program (ECP) was one of seven schools in Philadelphia and 59 schools nationally to be chosen to participate in a new Jewish literacy program entitled "PJ Goes to School." PJ Goes to School (PJGTS) is an outgrowth of The PJ Library program, a literacy initiative that sends lewish themed books and CDs into the homes of lewish children all across North America and Israel. In Greater Philadelphia, close to three thousand children receive PJ Library books monthly through the generosity of the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia, ACAJE/JOP, the Grinspoon Foundation and local donors.

Through PJGTS, GJC's ECP classrooms will be provided with multiple copies of the same Jewishly themed book, resource materials for educators and families, and in-depth professional development. ECP teachers will then use these materials as a spring-board for learning, and for making connections across all curricular areas. Since many of the children will also be receiving these books at home from PJ Library, the program is designed to foster community connections and build a vital bridge between school and home, thus supporting Jewish family journeys.

ECP Director, Mindy Pitkofsky, is extremely excited about this opportunity for the families in the school. "We are proud to have been chosen and we think it will be a wonderful source of enrichment in our already rich classrooms."

## Member Spotlight

Jay Furman, almost a century old, sits in his wheelchair in the park across the street from the Franklin Institute. He is placid and smiles the wide smile that anyone who has known Jay would find familiar.

For many years, well into his 90s, Jay volunteered at the Curator's office at the Franklin Institute every Friday morning. He has been an avid gardener and woodworker, bridge player and folk dancer. Jay is the oldest living alumna from the University of Pennsylvania, graduating in 1934. Only two years ago, he led the procession of the Old Guard at Penn's graduation. Until his late 90s, he would drive his Camry from Center City to GJC on Saturday mornings and could be seen rounding the corner from Greene Street onto Ellet, going the speed more appropriate to an 18 year old than one who was 97.

Now he sits in the sunshine, repeating the few things about his life that are on his mind this afternoon.

"I was born in Brooklyn," he says. "I went to the University of Pennsylvania and received a mechanical engineering degree. When I graduated Penn, there were no open jobs for me so I started a little business of my own.

"My brother, John and I started a business making venetian blinds. You get full size sheets, cut them, form them and paint them. My brother's two years older; he was in the same situation. He came down to Philadelphia and we went into business together."

That is all Jay says repeatedly during almost an hour of questioning, other than pointing out in a matter of fact way that his brain has become muddled. So it is up to his children and friends to describe the remarkable life that Jay has lived, particular-

ly when it comes to the history of the Germantown Jewish Centre. Jay was a charter member of GJC and vice-chair of the construction committee during the construction of the building.

After the venetian blind business, Jay went into business with Don Dorfman, also a GJC member, and formed the Clermont Engineering Company, a heating and air conditioning company on Delaware Avenue. Clermont installed the air conditioning and heating system at GJC when it was built in the late 1940s.

According to an article in Retirement Living, which featured Jay's active life as a model for aging, Clermont worked with recycling paper pulps developing filter systems for processing plants. After retiring in 1986, he began consulting for the Ceco and Clermont companies, to whom he sold his business. Jay continued consulting work until 1994.

Jay was married to Jean and they had three children – Zina, born in 1941, David, born in 1943 and Aviva, born in 1953. Jean and Jay lived in West Oak Lane after their marriage, Zina says, first on Johnson St, then on Glen Echo Rd, two blocks from the synagogue and finally in Lafayette Hill, before he moved into an assisted living facility in Center City. Jean had died at age 68 in 1987 from cancer.

"He's incredible," says Zina. "He is an inspiration to so many people. He's always looking to learn new things. He took up glassblowing in the last couple of years. He took courses in wood carving and made an incredible number of woodcarvings. He also was a folk dancer for many years with my mom. He used to dance on the steps of the art museum. He played bridge a couple times a week and entered tournaments. He's always been active and busy."

Jay was never busier than when GJC was constructing our building on Ellet Street. The fledgling congregation was housed on Emlen Street in Ross House and had outgrown its home.

When the decision was made to relocate to the irregular plot of land on Ellet Street, Jay served as vice-chair of the building committee and was involved in hiring the architect. He continued to play a vital role in the construction of the center. "We worked closely with the architect and contractor for five years in the planning and construction of our buildings," Jay said in a 2007 d'var torah.

Jay also created the Israel garden behind the synagogue and built the gazebo. In the dvar torah he delivered at age 95 to the congregation four years ago, he said "I have grown some huge tomatoes there and even made wine from our grapes."

In recent years, Jay was invited to speak to students at Temple University's occupational therapy department because he had aged so well. "He was an inspiration to them because he showed what's possible," Zina says. "He has had a positive attitude and a thirst for learning new things. He was so active and never sat still. He was a gardener from day one. I've never known him not to have a garden," she says. "He has a flower garden now on the 5th floor of his building that he started."

When Jay was a young 92, the article in Guide to Retirement Living described one day of his activities. "Following a couple of hours of volunteer work for the Recording for the Blind Program in King of Prussia, Jay Furman heads over to Germantown Jewish Centre, where, as a charter member, he is helping to put together a history of the synagogue. And this is just Monday. At 92, Mr. Furman's weekly schedule continues to be dominated by social and philanthropic activities."

The article goes on to say that Jay volunteered at the Curator's Office at the Franklin Institute, played bridge several days a week, and attended sculpting classes. He led a folk danc-

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ing class for his fellow residents. For the residents in wheelchairs, he taught square dance moves that they can do while seated.

Even in his confusion, Jay keeps looking ahead. He promised officials at the University of Pennsylvania that next year he'll be in the procession when he reaches 100 on May 16. His daughter, Zina says, "He was just talking to someone about making an herb garden in his building next year."

At 95, Jay said in his d'var torah, "In my 70 years as a member, GJC has been like a second home for me, along with my other activities like international folk dancing, wood carving, bridge and volunteering. I have had a full interesting life so far."

Every single year I come home from summer after spending a month away from home, and I say, "Wow, that was the best summer of my life." The classic Jewish kid will spend their summers in Jewish camp. I went to a junior camp called Sprout Lake in New York. Together, upstate Hadassah and Young Judaea run Sprout Lake as well as other junior camps across the country. I went when I was twelve years old for my first year and I loved it so much that I had to go back. I went to Sprout Lake for two more years and met such fun and terrific people.

When that camp finished, the oldest kids all move up to go to the senior camp, which is also in New York, called Tel Yehuda. Young Judaea also ran this camp, and all of the Young Judaea junior camps feed into this senior camp. This made our age

In November, we will have our very exciting, fun filled Craft Show where you can find something for everyone at affordable prices. Phyllis Kauffman says that it will be a great time for all.



## Social Action Update

## **Saving our Drinking Water:** Maintaining the Moratorium on Fracking in the Delaware

attended the GJC Social Action Committee's showing of Josh Fox's film "Gasland" last spring, only vaguely aware of what fracking was. evening of education about the gas industry's highly toxic method of extracting natural gas, and about the powerful propaganda campaign to promote natural gas as "clean" energy, affected me deeply. I continued to educate myself about fracking, and I descended into despair for our future. This was a difficult place to be, particularly as the parent of a young, curious child, and I knew that I needed to find a path out of the despair.

The path out of despair came with an e-mail invitation from Rabbi Arthur Waskow to join a committee working on an interfaith, spiritual response to fracking called "Blessing the Waters." Through working on this committee, I met kindred spirits who were seeking both a path to hope and a path to action. Led by Rabbi Mordechai Liebling, our committee shared prayer and praise and sat with our despair and crafted a beautiful and powerful interfaith ceremony for the evening following the Shale Gas Outrage rally. (Shale Gas Outrage, organized by the Philadelphia-based Protecting our Waters, was a response to the gas industry's major conference in Philadelphia convention center September 7-8.) Blessing the Waters, of which the GJC SAC was a sponsor, offered nurturing of the spirit in the midst of powerful threats to our well-being here in this state. At the end of our ceremony, many of us took spiritual teacher and ecological activist Joanna Macy's "Five Vows":

I vow to myself and each of you:

- 1. To commit myself daily to the healing of our world and the welfare of all beings.
- 2. To live on earth more lightly and less violently in the food, products and energy I consume.
- 3. To draw strength and guidance from the living Earth, the ancestors, the future beings, and all my brothers and sisters of all species.
- 4. To support each other in our work for the world and to ask for help when I feel
- 5. To pursue a daily spiritual practice that clarifies my mind, strengthens my heart and supports me in observing these vows. (Be in touch if you would like a card with these vows for your wallet).

We can all take action to save our precious fresh water supply. The Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) is now scheduled to vote on November 21 on regulations which, if passed, could allow up to 20,000 gas wells along the Delaware River watershed, the sole drinking water supply for fifteen million people, including those of us in New York City and Philadelphia. Please join me in getting educated and in demanding that the moratorium not be lifted. One action you can take today is to call Governor Corbett's office (717-787-2500), as well as the White House comment line (202-456-1111), and request that they not approve regulations to permit fracking in the Delaware River Basin.
