s a rabbinical student, one of my As a rabbinical student, "Which is teachers asked the class, "Which is your favorite holiday?" As you might imagine, I had a very hard time answering. How could I choose Hanukah over Sukkot? Or Purim over Pesach?? But when it comes right down to it, I think my favorite holidays of the year are Rosh ha-Shanah and Yom Kippur, the High Holidays, a time that always fill me with excitement. Why? The High Holidays invite us to take stock of where we are in our lives and where the world is and to compare both ourselves and the world to our highest vision for them, the vision enshrined in Torah. When we make that comparison, we inevitably find that there is a considerable gap between our aspirations and the reality we see around us. We address that gap not by adjusting our vision but by gathering inspiration to change ourselves and the world. That process is what is known as Tikkun ha-Olam - literally, "repairing the world," causing the world and our lives to conform more closely to our vision.

This is a time of immense challenges as well as immense possibilities for change and growth. How can we imagine a new future for ourselves and for the world we call home? What steps can we take to lead toward that vision? And how will we engage with the GJC community to learn together,

pray together, support each other, and work together to make this New Year different for ourselves and those around us?

We will have many wonderful chances in the upcoming year to examine these questions both personally and as a community. First, GJC's Social Action Committee is remaking itself as the Tikkun Olam Coordinating Team in order to better bring the richness of GJC's many active groups working on many different issues to the community and to encourage everyone to find a way to get involved (see page 17). We have an exciting schedule of adult education classes, as well as activities for kids and families - both coordinated by the marvelous Rabbi Alanna Sklover - that will bring us face to face with these issues in new ways (see page 22). And we have an exciting schedule of special events that will bring these issues to the fore. Just a few examples: The Rosh ha-Shanah JAM (Jewish Arts and Music) program for young families will feature a magical, musical puppet play about how Adam and Eve learn about humanity's interdependence with the animal and plant life on the brand new Earth; we are grateful to the Harold and Renee Berger Family Engagement Endowment Fund for sponsoring this program. The Bregman Memorial program on Yom Kippur will bring us the gift of Curt Pontz and Rabbi David Teutsch teaching us how we can take an ethical approach to buying and selling as business people and consumers. And our Rabbi Charry Memorial Weekend in November will feature Daniel Matt, one of the world's foremost authorities on Jewish mysticism, who will help us understand the roots of Tikkun

Olam in medieval Jewish texts and its meaning for us today. I encourage you to take advantage of all of the opportunities we have to learn from and with each other this year.

The High Holidays are a valuable time to come together with a large cross-section of our community to pray and sing and think and talk about how we want to live our lives in the upcoming year. Sign up for the Erev Rosh ha-Shanah dinner at 6:30, and come to the special Kol T'ru'ah singing service at 7:30. Bring your children to one of the range of services for young people on Rosh ha-Shanah and on Yom Kippur. Check out the Kol D'mamah contemplative service or Torah-centered Yoga. Study texts with fantastic new Rabbinic Intern Becca Richman on Rosh ha-Shanah and Yom Kippur afternoons. Participate in the musical Ne'ilah service in the Charry Sanctuary to close Yom Kippur, featuring the combined voices of Nina Peskin, Becca, and myself. Or enjoy teen activity groups, childcare for the youngest GJC members, services in the Charry Sanctuary, Minyan Masorti, and Dorshei Derekh, and more! Please come and explore it all, and bring along those who are interested in GIC to see all that we offer!

As we enter the New Year, I encourage you to try something new, to open yourself up to ideas and activities that you may not have encountered before, to stretch and grow in new ways that you may not have previously imagined. The year stretches out before us like a blank canvas, waiting for us to fill it with learning, growing, and engaging *continued on page 4*



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President's Message

Greetings! As I write this column, it is the height of summer and hard to be-

lieve that the days are shortening, and the temperatures cooling, and soon enough it will be autumn. No doubt my sense of the seasons is shaped by my school-age children, but I imagine many of you also experience August as a time of quiet anticipation. It's a time when people often slow down, and gather strength, before September brings that great burst of activity as we recommit ourselves to our projects and aspirations.

Germantown Jewish Centre is undergoing its own version of renewal. The office seems quiet but just under the calm surface a hundred events are being brewed for fall and beyond. Soon enough the place will explode with High Holiday fervor. At the same time, a fabulous group of GJC members is working on rebuilding the synagogue's relationship to one of its core spiritual and religious commitments – tikkun olam, the effort to repair and perfect the world through human attitude and action.

Tikkun olam has been central to GJC's identity for decades, harkening back to when Rabbi Elias Charry led door-to-door campaigns to promote Mount Airy's racial integration and to fight blockbusting practices in the 1950's. Since then, GJC has been a leader in social action on a huge and expanding range of issues.

Today, GJC members energetically engage tikkun olam through a variety of activities through the Social Action Committee. To name just a few, these include hosting families in need through the Interfaith Hospitality Network, supporting refugee and immigrant families with HIAS PA, and working to improve education and eliminate poverty through the synagogue's active participation in the POWER Interfaith community. Other parts of the synagogue community are engaged as well. The Religious School, Early Childhood Program, and teen programs include tikkun olam in the curricula. The Men's and Women's Clubs, Hazak, and GJC's prayer groups also sponsor programs geared toward supporting our efforts to make the world a better place.

Given the vibrancy of GJC's tikkun olam efforts, our Social Action Committee is now reorganizing to present a more comprehensive approach for organizing and managing this energy. The Committee is transitioning to become the "Tikkun Olam Coordinating Team," which will guide, coordinate, and support the many activities occurring within the synagogue community. The Team is presenting Tikkun Olam@GJC as the new face of this work. The synagogue is also presenting a new logo around this work and creating a link on our website to enable members to indicate how they'd like to be involved, and be matched up with opportunities to participate. Stay tuned for these developments!

Let me thank Andi Moselle and Davis Mosenkis, the current chairs of the Coordinating Team, for their commitment to making this transition a reality. If you have any questions or want to learn more about how you can participate, please give them a call. So many others have been integral to GJC's social action work, and it would be absurd to try to mention them all. But let me also thank Maxine Margolies as the long-time chair of the Social Action Committee for her service and support of this effort. Maxine will remain part of the Team and is co-chair, with Dayle Friedman, of GJC's work supporting refugee and immigrant families. Let me also thank Howard Bilofksy, who is spearheading the synagogue's work with POWER on nonpartisan voter registration and education. As he and I have discussed, this is a vital issue for the health of our civil society. Rabbi Charry would be proud that GJC remains so energetic today.

Let me note that the concept of tikkun olam is not limited to external outreach in the form of social justice work. It also encompasses the idea that humans are part of the unfolding of God's creation and will. To honor that concept, it may be said that the external outreach of tikkun olam must be paired with an internal spiritual practice. As one reinforces the other, we can heal both the brokenness that is visible and that which lies inside. In this conception, tikkun olam is not geared only to making the world better, but to make us better as well. And as we grow in compassion and justice, so we promote these traits in the world around. This is a worthy goal, and we should be proud that GJC has so thoroughly committed itself to the work.

As a concluding note, GJC was officially established on September 28, 1936. This synagogue has had a pretty good run over the last eight decades years. We remain strong, and can forward to the decades to come. Please join me in wishing GJC a happy 80th birthday!

It's been a hot summer, what with political conventions and impassioned speeches, as well as soaring temperatures and not much rain to cool things off. But Hazak has stayed cool within the rooms of GJC, enjoying films, books and opera.

On July 20, Hazak showed "Frozen River," the first in a series of films planned for the year. Set in upstate New York on the Canadian border within Indian territory, the story revolves around a working class mother of two boys - recently abandoned by her gambler husband and a native American woman who is desperate to regain custody of her young son. Since neither woman has enough money to meet her needs, they form an unlikely (and illegal) business relationship. The film addresses themes of poverty, single parenting in harsh conditions, racism, and illegal immigration, with tenderness and a gritty realism. Coleman facilitated a lively discussion encompassing all these issues a stimulating evening.

Then on August 24, Maestro Sam Feinberg entertained and instructed us, as he does every year, about opera. This year his theme was important tenors. He played selections and film clips. We are so grateful to Sam for his continued willingness to prepare and present a stimulating evening of opera!

Nedivot Lev (Offerings of the Heart)

Ex. 25:1-2 ~ Adonai spoke to Moses saying: Tell the Israelite people to bring Me gifts; you shall accept gifts for me from every person whose heart so moves him

To build the sacred space of the Tabernacle in the wilderness, each of the Israelites brought an offering of their heart. Each issue, we will highlight how members of our community are bringing their offerings of the heart to build and enrich the sacred space of our community.

Rabbi Alanna Sklover, Germantown Jewish Centre's Director of Lifelong Learning, has been spending her summer getting ready for the upcoming Religious School year, set to begin September 7. "It's like an iceberg," she explains, "Most of the work [we do] is below the surface, unseen." One of her tasks involves gathering special needs resources and assembling teen aide volunteers, madreichim, with a special needs coordinator. This coordinator, who the Religious School provides for its students, is also available outside of Religious School hours to collaborate with Rabbi Alanna and parents, if need be. There is also a designated Hebrew Resource Room, for one-on-one learning - particularly useful for students with sensory integration issues. The coordinator supervises a few madreichim in the Resource Room, as well as other madreichim who act as "wrap-around" support for some students. This program, generously funded by The Julius and Ray Charlestein Foundation, supports the Hebrew Resource Room and the madreichim, allowing all of our students to benefit from what our Religious School has to offer.

The effects of this kind of support are tremendous. One young student with sensory integration issues had a rough start to a recent school year. A teen aide worked with him patiently throughout the year and the student's mother raves about the aide: "The teen aide... was absolutely phenomenal with [my son]. It was a wonderful experience. It got to the point where he loved to go to Religious School." She continues, "The school was very supportive. Instead of it being an exclusive environment, for [him] it was a very inclusive environment."

Rabbi Alanna points out that "inclusion should be with, not to or for. Diversity is an ongoing process, not a goal." It is crucial for children to be involved in creating systems and routines that help facilitate their learning. To this end, Rabbi Alanna works with students and their parents, and often their secular teachers, to create systems that best suit the students' needs. One student with comprehension challenges already had a system of graphic aids in place at his secular school, so Rabbi Alanna worked with him, his parents, and his teachers to create similar resources for him to use during Religious School. These graphics helped with his general comprehension as well as his Religious School comprehension. His fellow students found these visual aids useful as well – particularly those for the Hebrew letters and the order of the service. The visual aids, while intended to support a student with comprehension challenges, actually gave everyone structure with no "othering."

Rabbi Alanna and Rabbi Zeff collaborate with the families of BBMM students with special needs to make sure they're not excluded from participating. They work with the students so they get comfortable and confident during their B'nei Mitzvot preparations. Giving a d'var Torah, for instance, can be particularly nerve-wracking, but Rabbi Alanna and Rabbi Zeff work with the kids so they can embrace the process. Together, they aim for "that one moment when [we're] working with the kid and their family to achieve something they're proud of. A bar or bat mitzvah doesn't have to look just one way. Having the BBMM program be kid-centric elevates the process for everyone."

One inspired – and inspiring – way the students learned about inclusion and its place amongst Jewish values this past year can be seen on the Religious School YouTube channel. February is Jewish Disabilities Inclusion Month and as part of the Wednesday electives - breira - 2nd through 6th grade students chose from a variety of topics relating to disabilities and inclusion and explored their connection to Judaism. One group of students made stop-motion animation videos blending stories from Jewish texts with special needs, for instance, explaining how Moses got his stutter. Another group's video told the stories of characters from the Torah - like Isaac - who they deemed "Jewish Disabilities Heroes." Yet another group partnered with Phill Goldberg and the Jewish Institute for the Blind. Together, they were able to raise \$250 for the Institute, while learning what the organization does for the youth in Israel.

Since its founding, Germantown Jewish Centre has valued diversity and inclusion, emphasizing a welcoming environment for everyone. As a community within the larger GJC community, our Religious School is able to engage differences and reach beyond our own lives and experiences. In supporting GJC, you enable our Religious School students to learn empathy and kindness, becoming better Jews as they engage with the worldwide community.

If there is a committee at GJC that demonstrates the values of our community of communities, it is the Chesed Committee, which cooks food for GJC members and ECP families who have just welcomed a new baby, and GJC members who are ill, who have recently lost a family member, or are recovering from surgery.

Kathy Amrom and Elana Hollo, both members of Minyan Masorti, took on the Chesed Committee's leadership last March, after Rabbi Fredi Cooper retired from creating the committee and leading it for many years. Kathy and Elana have held one cooking session with 20 volunteers that "was so successful that we filled up the freezer in the Marcus kitchen", Kathy said.

When she spoke in August, there were 25-30 packages still left unused. "You can't predict how quickly or how slowly people will use them," she said. "When it gets down to 15 packages, sometime after the Jewish holidays, it'll be time to cook again." Kathy's job is to keep an eye on the food supply and then schedule another cooking session, which means coordinating with the mashgiach and coordinating volunteers.

As Kathy pointed out, scheduling a session can be complicated. A mashgiach supervises the preparation of food to make sure it is done according to the rules of kashrut. The mashgiachs used by GJC, Rabbi Barry Dov Lerner and Barbara Lerner have generously offered to teach Kathy and Elana how to do that job themselves, thus saving

the cost of paying outsiders to supervise the kashrut. It also means that Kathy and Elana will be able to help GJC members who prepare their own food for their celebrations.

The Chesed Committee is financed through a separate fund to which people can donate. Given that Elana has started a new job in Jersey City, NJ, Kathy volunteered to do the food shopping. "I went to several supermarkets to check the kashrut and prices," she said. "Some places it's better to buy the flour, some places it's better to buy the flour, some places it's better to buy the oil. I can buy most of the things between BJ's and Giant."

The volunteers have three hours to make soup, challah and kugel in the kitchen. Recipes must be assembled, groceries bought and volunteers called in. "You need to be organized to get all that cooking done in three hours," Kathy noted. And they needed to replenish kitchen equipment. "They had two knives, one big bowl and three spoons," Kathy said. "We thought about the equipment you'd need to do what we needed to do and went to a restaurant supply store." (Kathy said that according to the mashgiach, the Chesed Committee is not allowed to use the extensive equipment belonging to GJC's onsite caterer.) "We have to cover every table surface with thin plastic covering. We plan what to ask people to do first, second and third," she continued. "We know how to double a recipe, but we had to multiply that recipe for 25. I was worried whether the challah would come out." To her relief, the challah came out beautifully.

Kathy said she was asked to take over the Chesed committee after she led a session on biblical foods during the 2015 Summer Sampler. "It's a thing I've been into for a while, researching what grew in Babylonia and Israel and what people ate," Kathy said. "There's an institute in Israel that's researched recipes and put them out there. So I got into making different breads and soups. I think Nina saw that I enjoyed cooking foods and I do love to cook. But it's different when you're making 50 containers of soup, 50 challot and 50 kugel casseroles." The meals are delivered by rabbinical staff along with grape juice and hand-made cards by students of the GJC religious school.

When she isn't leading the Chesed Committee, Kathy is an accomplished painter, whose work, under her original name, Kathleen Shaver, has been exhibited at the Cosmopolitan Club, Abington Art Center, University City Arts League and many other venues.

Elana Hollo embodies the cliché that when you want something done, ask a busy person. She recently took on her dream job working for the Social Security Administration as an administrative law judge. "It's significant step up in responsibility," she said. A longtime full-time worker for the federal government, Elana serves in the executive, not judicial, branch of government. People who are denied disability benefits can go before a judge. There are about 1,200 such judges nationwide and a significant backlog of 24 months to have an appeal heard. Her job entails being in Jersey City, NJ five days a week.

Despite her busy schedule, she says, "I've always done a lot of work for the synagogue. I love the Chesed Committee. The synagogue is full of people who are generous of heart. I'm really glad that Kathy and I were asked to be co-chairs of the chesed committee. I like doing it. It's really important and it helps a lot of people."

The rabbinic staff takes care of visiting the sick and delivering the food, she said. "That was in part so that volunteers like Kathy and I wouldn't know information that was conficontinued on next page dential," if the person didn't wan their difficulties to become common knowledge. "People are really, really touched by the Chesed Committee, and although we cook 60 meals, we don't know to whom they go," Elana said.

Elana's original inspiration for the idea behind the Chesed Committee was intensely personal. When she and her husband were fairly new to the community in 1997, she was pregnant with her daughter, Naomi. "Someone in the minyan visited me while I was on bed rest and asked me what I was eating, and I answered 'toast'," Elana recalled. "I didn't grow up in such a generous community and this person arranged for me to get food while I was on bed rest for several weeks. I have tried to follow that initial lead."

Again in 2001, a personal need arose again. Their daughter, Elisheva, was born early and needed immediate very serious surgery at CHOP (Children's Hospital of Philadelphia). Someone in Minyan Masorti arranged for someone to deliver meals to them at the hospital. "My parents took the two older kids, and I remember slipping out of the NICU to eat a meal that someone from the minyan had delivered to me," Elana recalled. "I thought I would forever repay that kindness. I would help other people the way they helped me."

Then, a third traumatic event hit them. Elana and her husband Juha's son, Mati, was struck by a car as he ran with his high school cross-country team. He suffered multiple injuries. (Mati has since healed.) "Then Hurricane Sandy happened," she said. "It made such a difference to my whole family that we were microwaving these meals from the minyan. "People were just incredibly kind and supported us. It was an emotional upheaval and I felt I have a lifetime of kindness to pay back. I'm not alone in this, but I've always tried to cook for people" at difficult or trying times in their lives. "When I got on the GJC board, you have to chair a committee, and I got to chair this one."

While the Chesed Committee will make up a basket of food to be delivered by rabbinic staff making a pastoral call, when it comes to a need for longer term attention and care, community members are invited to alert the office to let volunteers know to visit them. "You might just want someone to get things from the market for you, if you can't get out," Elana said. "You only need to ask. If you speak up, there are plenty of people ready to step in."

Most often, each minyan takes care of its own, even though there is crossover among friends and generous community members. The Chesed Committee, on the other hand, serves everybody. "People from every area of the synagogue come to cook, and the meals go to anybody and everybody," Elana said. "It's a great way for the minyans to function together.

"One thing I really want to stress is there are so many people who arrange meals and cook and drive people," Elana concluded. "After all these years, I'm still incredibly impressed. I'm just trying to emulate other people I know. I'm always impressed by how incredibly caring people are. I feel like I'm a follower. I'm trying to catch up."







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Building a World of Love: GJC's Welcome Team Sponsors a Syrian Refugee Family

We did not know what to expect when we approached a modest brick row house in Northeast Philadelphia on Mother's Day. We'd been dreaming of this moment for months. On the other side of the door were a mother and two daughters. They had not been anticipating this moment for months, or even weeks. But then again, very little of what they have experienced in the past few years was anything they could have known to expect.

Aisha, her husband, Ayad, and their three children have been on the move for several years since they left their home in war-torn Syria.¹ They spent time in Istanbul, where they applied for refugee status in the US. They finally arrived in Philadelphia in February. They received federal government support via HIAS PA: a fully furnished apartment, modest cash assistance, and three months of case management assistance to help them transition to life in Philadelphia. They spoke no English when they arrived, and knew no one. They are making their way as strangers in a strange land.

We were greeted by Aisha, a modestly clad woman with a hijab and a warm smile. Her daughters, Rasha (12) and Fatimah (10), gazed shyly at me, Maxine Margolies and Sarah Braun. Also present in their immaculate home were Carrie Fox-Kline, head of refugee resettlement at HIAS PA, and Yazeed, a volunteer interpreter. Ayad and their four year-old son, Raheem, were not present. Raheem is seriously ill and has been hospitalized since they arrived. One parent must be with him at all times. We asked Aisha if it would be OK for us and our friends to become their friends, to help them learn English, and to help out if we could. *Inshallah*, Aisha said, meaning, God willing. And in English, she said: thank you.

Since May, the nine volunteers on our GJC Refugee Welcome Team have been immersed in our new friendship with Aisha, Ayad and their kids. One or two team members are special friends for each person in the family. As friends, we visit every week or two and offer help with homework and speaking English. We have found the whole family to be eager learners, including Ayad, who never learned to read in Arabic, because he had to drop out of school at age 7. Anna Herman, a member of our leadership team, has taken Aisha and the girls on a welcome outing to the Natural History Museum. Team members frequently drive the parents and children to medical appointments, and make sure that they have interpreters.

Two of our members have been advocating for one of the older children, who has a physical disability. They have visited her at school, met with teachers and administrators, and reviewed school and medical records. They found that the public school to which she had been assigned was not a promising match for her needs, and searched until they found a private Catholic school that specializes in students with her disability. Through their creative efforts, this child will begin the new school year in a sensitive environment where she will have a chance to learn and thrive.

The work of our team members is not easy. Language barriers make communi-

cation frustrating (though all of us have become quite facile at using apps for quick translation). The systems our family must navigate are labyrinthine and maddening. We can offer our hearts and our hands as a modest support, but this family's needs are deep and broad. We cannot solve the overwhelming problems they face.

On the other hand, the rewards of our efforts are immense. We have encountered people who are meeting an unimaginable series of trials with grace and dignity. We have been gifted with warmth and easy connection-with our family, and among members of our team. We have also been inspired by the generosity our family has sparked in the GJC community. For example, when we learned that our family was sweltering in their apartment, we put out a call for donations of air conditioners, and received offers of seven in a single day.

Improbably, and blessedly, our Syrian family has helped us to experience the words of the Psalms, *Olam hesed yibaneh*, a world of love will be built. In this small context, through each act of kindness, a world of love is being fashioned, for them and for us.

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
