THE PATH OF TORAH by Rabbi Adam Zeff

We are living through fraught times, when the human capacity for selfishness, injustice, and hatred is on full view in the world around us, affecting us at the level of politics and government, in the civil square, and in our personal lives. The forces of intolerance—represented by renewed

anti-immigrant fervor, open expressions of racism and white supremacist ideology, and resurgent anti-Semitism—seem ascendant. Leaders insist that ethics are irrelevant, apology is never necessary, and care for those who suffer is a sign of weakness. These are times of moral crisis.

In such times, the High Holidays come to us with a vision of a different path: the path of Torah. This vision insists that we have not only the capacity, but also the obligation to care for others, to fight for justice, and to love our fellow human beings as ourselves. It challenges us with high ethical standards, pushes us to apologize for our wrongdoing, and calls us to speak and to act on behalf of those who are in need. The High Holidays also invite us to make this vision a reality in the context of community, with the support of others striving to follow this path, even in the most difficult times.

This is the time to come together to renew our commitment to this path and to each other. We have been engaged during this past year in a deep discussion about how our communal lives connect with the public sphere and that conversation will continue this fall. During the High Holidays, through my sermons and through the Bregman Memorial Program on Yom Kippur afternoon, we will explore how Jewish tradition guides us to identify and combat structural racism and anti-Semitism, what methods we can use to do the work of *t'shuvah*—repentance, forgiveness, and return—on the personal and societal levels, and how we can do all of this work with the knowledge that our lives are finite and our time limited.

As the year begins, I want to encourage you to take advantage of some of the opportunities that GJC offers, perhaps in ways you haven't in previous years. We have an exciting schedule of adult education classes, celebrations and activities for kids and families, new ways to study and pray together, and chances to partner on social justice issues with others inside and outside the GJC community. This year we welcome Rabbi Rebecca Richman as our new Assistant Rabbi and Beit Midrash Director, and we will be the lucky beneficiaries of her teaching and creativity all year

long! The Rosh ha-Shanah JAM (Jewish Arts and Music) program for young families will feature a magical, musical puppet play about how t'shuvah came into the world and enabled human beings to transcend their mistakes. We are grateful to the Harold and Renee Berger Family Engagement Endowment Fund for sponsoring this program. We have a new schedule of different types of Friday night services that will rotate throughout the year, including RSI Shabbat on second and fourth Fridays, a service that features upcoming musical artists from across the country, and Shabbat in the Neighborhood every other first Friday, when a service and potluck are held a home near GJC. You'll soon get into the swing of what's happening each week; check them out! Our Rabbi Charry Memorial Weekend in November will feature Rabbi Aviva Richman from Hadar, and we have many other exciting events planned. Explore these programs and all that we offer; we have so many different ways to learn from and grow with each other this year.

The High Holidays are a valuable time to come together with a large cross-section of our community to pray and sing and think and talk about how we want to live our lives in the upcoming year. Sign up for the Erev Rosh ha-Shanah dinner at 6:30 PM, and come to the special musical Erev Rosh ha-Shanah service at 7:15 that night. Bring your children to one of the range of services for young people on the days of Rosh ha-Shanah and Yom Kippur. Check out the Kol D'mamah contemplative service or Torahcentered Yoga. Study texts with Rabbi Richman on Rosh ha-Shanah and Yom Kippur afternoons. Participate in the musical Ne'ilah service in the Charry Sanctuary to close Yom Kippur, featuring the combined voices of Nina Peskin, Rabbi Richman, and myself. Or enjoy teen activity groups, childcare for the youngest GJC members, services in the Charry Sanctuary, Minyan Masorti, and Dorshei Derekh, and more! Please come and explore it all, and bring along those who are interested in GJC to see all that we offer!

As we enter the New Year, I encourage you to open yourself up to ideas and activities that you may not have encountered before, to stretch and grow in new ways that you may not have previously imagined. The year stretches out before us like a blank canvas, waiting for us to fill it with learning, growing, and engaging with Jewish tradition and with each other, enhancing the meaning of our lives together in new and exciting ways.

My wife, Cheryl, and our sons, Zeke, Avi, and Mati, join me in wishing you a new year full of the blessings of health, happiness, joy, and peace. *L'shanah tovah!*

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The High Holy Days are a time for reflection. I wish to reflect on the dedication of our synagogue lay leadership. It has been a sincere honor serving my first year as President in this wonderful community. Over that time, we have accomplished a lot, and there is more in the pipeline. Allow me to highlight some of the challenging work synagogue leadership the has undertaken.

I am awestruck by the 11 committed members of the Executive Committee (EC) with whom I have had the pleasure of working. We convene monthly to conduct synagogue business, and there are intermittent meetings for urgent matters, in-person, or by phone, or by other fancy conferencing technologies. We don't always agree, especially regarding the more controversial challenges that are presented, but the level of mutual respect, sincerity, and intellectual integrity is unmatched.

The five outgoing, and the four incoming EC members are deserving of recognition.

Connie Katz, Alex Seldin, Art Ellis, Greg Lattanzi and Lawrence Charap have each have left their mark. It goes without saying that our leaders, Executive Director Nina Peskin and Rabbi Adam Zeff, are the backbones of our community, but Connie Katz is the heart. Connie has served on the Executive Committee for many years as Corresponding Secretary. Her warm, personal notes to congregants during good times and bad have lifted up many spirits. In addition, Connie is one of our prized fundraisers, because, really.... who can say "no" to Connie?! Reminiscing about her years of service, Connie said that she will "miss being part of this intimate group of leaders."

We were fortunate that Alex Seldin served on the EC as Financial Secretary and that Greg Lattanzi served as Vice President of Education. With Alex's big brain and command of finance, much of our fiscal health is attributed to his leadership. Alex enjoyed the challenge of working through "some thorny issues that reflected a multitude of viewpoints." Greg was a solid and reliable presence on the EC and who also doubled as the Religious School Parent Co-Chair. As such, he kept us up-to-date on the happenings in the education of our kids, including the important search for a Director of Education.

Art Ellis is a force. He spearheaded the High Holiday appeal for two years, breaking records each time. I recently asked him to muse over his three years of service on the EC. Art said it was a "privilege to serve our community" and "even the most mundane topics (such as clogged drain pipes in the parking lot) contribute in some way to the well-being of our congregation." For Art, and many of us, the security issues have been most challenging. "It's tough to balance creating a welcoming environment and necessary security procedures, while keeping in mind the additional costs of having a safe building." But challenging as these issues may appear, they are no match for Art's dedication to our community.

Lastly, we say farewell to Lawrence Charap, who, after two years of serving as the Recording Secretary, wants to spend more time on Minyan Masorti affairs. We begged him not to leave us! Lawrence was a superstar minute-taker. His laser-sharp focus for summarizing even the most complex and sensitive of discussions into coherent minutes served to inform the community of all goings-on. Lawrence always piped in with perspicacious points that would gently result in decision-making trending in a new direction.

We heartily welcome our new EC members, Diane Ajl, David Hahn, Beth Stearman, and Wayne Zukin, all of whom are off to an enthusiastic start. Diane was "deeply honored" when asked to serve, because GJC has been central to her and her family's life for years. She is looking forward to contributing to the important work of the synagogue. Beth has served GJC in many ways over the years—she was a Board member and also had various roles in Women of GJC. She is glad to be serving on the EC and learning the inner workings of GJC because "the community means a great deal" to her. For David, serving on the EC provides him with "the opportunity to listen to the range of voices on the many issues that we face in our community and practice the value of shalom bayit that we can all still eat and pray together after we talk." David is eager to meet and work with new people in the community, especially those who may see the world differently. Wayne has wasted no time adding value. This summer, he assisted GJC navigate the much needed replacement of our air conditioning system.

In the past year, the EC has achieved several noteworthy milestones. I am thrilled to report that, once again, following on the heels of my capable predecessors—Chip Becker and Matthieu Shapiro—our fiscal affairs are in order. We finished the last fiscal year with a surplus, and budgeted a \$22,000 deficit for 2019-20, the lowest projected deficit in GJC history. Our operating budget exceeds \$2 million. Our endowment exceeds \$4 million, and our operating reserves remain healthy at over \$500,000. Much of this good news is credited to the expansion of our Early Childhood Program. We are increasing our enrollment, adding new classrooms, improving our curriculum, and still maintaining the cozy atmosphere and high standards for which the school is known.

Still, we are regularly confronted with urgent repairs needed by our aging building, like a broken boiler and broken air conditioning system. Our Building Preservation Sub-Committee, led by the indefatigable Steve Levin, has identified projects for renovation. New flooring and lighting in the Marcus Auditorium have been installed, as well as window restoration in the school wing. In the (Continued on page 4)

future, expect budgeting plans for landscaping, the parking lot, and the roof. to name a few.

Ad hoc committee work remains an essential part of synagogue life. One theme of all of the hardworking committees is the gathering of community input. Through surveys and parlor meetings, your voices have been heard and have guided decision-making. The Values Committee, which was the brainchild of David Mosenkis and Rabbi David Teutsch, produced a rich, meaningful document espousing our community values. These values, which are distinct from a mission statement, will infuse our work with purpose and meaning, and enable us to tackle difficult subjects while being mindful of a core, collectively determined framework.

The Security Committee, co-chaired by Will Shapiro and Barbara Menin, has been tasked with recommending security measures in a post- Pittsburgh/Poway landscape. For the foreseeable future, following the Security Committee's recommendations, we have retained a professional security officer on Saturdays during Shabbat observance, as well as the use of a single entrance. The Security Committee also recommended that we design a "Security

Shabbat," when Jewish texts related to safety are studied, and some practical security tips for our GJC building are shared.

The Committee to Consider Public Stance on Issues of Public Concern, spearheaded by Dan Livney, is debating tough questions about whether GJC should sponsor and endorse public political events, and whether GJC should issue statements on matters of public concern...and, if yes, how and when? Grappling with competing voices, there are no easy answers here. The committee's hard work will continue in the months ahead.

One nascent committee is most worthy of mention. This committee was formed with the goal of ushering GJC—its leadership, its clergy, its staff and its members—into a new paradigm of truly being a multi-cultural, non-racist, inclusive synagogue. Through training, programming, and education, we are ready to move in this direction.

As my first year comes to end, I am most grateful for the trust you have placed in me. I have grown personally from this experience and I enthusiastically embark on the year ahead. *Shanah tovah*, GJC!



Adult Literacy Initiative by Elliott Seif and Rivkah Walton

The GJC Adult Literacy Initiative was inspired by the 2019 Ralph Granger Memorial Shabbat program, which examined "What Does It Mean To Live in the Poorest Big City in

America? How Poverty Affects Everything from Health & Housing to Education & Employment." From the panel, we learned that 26% of adults in Philadelphia are functionally illiterate. Because the ability to read is key to so many functions in life, the Literacy Initiative was conceived of as a way that individual GJC members could have a direct impact on relieving poverty in the lives of fellow Philadelphians.

Beginning in Spring 2019, the GJC Adult Literacy Initiative, with the blessing of the Tikkun Olam Coordinating Team, solicited a *hevra* (group) of GJC volunteers to take part in Tutor Corps, a group of trained and dedicated volunteers who provide Project HOME residents with one-to-one tutoring. They provide support for a variety of adult literacy challenges (both reading and math), such as improving reading and writing skills, getting a driver's license, or passing the GED exam.

Project HOME is a major multifaceted, multi-service non-profit agency helping people break the cycle of homelessness and poverty in Philadelphia since 1989. It primarily provides previously homeless individuals and families with "permanent, supportive housing" that provides both a home and a variety of services. Project HOME's mission, vision, and values emphasize:

- a strong spiritual conviction of the dignity of each person
- all persons are entitled to decent, affordable housing and access to quality education, employment, and health care
- the transformational power of building relationships and community.

Elliott Seif and Rivkah Walton shared responsibility for outreach and for organizing informational programs and training. GJC contracted with Jill Gates Smith, MA, the trainer who oversees the Project HOME adult literacy initiative, to provide training and assistance in organizing the program.

GJC members were invited to an informational program in April at the Seifs' home, at which Jill presented an overview of Tutor Corps and responded to questions. Several other prospective participants visited the monthly Third Thursday Tutor Corps Meeting at Project HOME for a similar introduction.

On Sunday, June 2, Jill presented a dedicated seven-hour training, to prepare the GJC hevra to join the Project HOME Tutor Corps. The training was held at the home of Charlie and Lyndall Miller, who generously offered the use of their first floor (see photo). It was the perfect setting for this relatively intimate event, and provided ample breakout spaces for small groups. The synagogue made available the AV equipment we needed.

The seven GJC members who participated in the training responded enthusiastically to the program, which was a combination of lecture, discussion, and paired exercises. The training acquainted us with the Project HOME learners and the particular issues they may bring from their backgrounds and gave tutors the tools necessary to assess and respond to their needs. It emphasized the various ways that tutors might work with participants and how to assure their dignity as the tutoring proceeds. The training program stresses the mutual, collaborative nature of Project HOME tutoring. The GJC training also gave us the opportunity to create a sense of community among GJC participants.

Next Steps

The GJC trainees are prepared to be Project HOME Tutor Corps volunteers. After obtaining clearances to work in facilities where children are present, they are being matched with adult learners. In addition to tutoring Project HOME adults, GJC tutors will meet monthly on third Thursdays with other Tutor Corps volunteers for support and to receive ongoing supervision. The GJC Initiative will also develop carpooling opportunities and occasional special programming for the GJC hevra.

Elliott also is working with Jill to create a resource list of basic online resources for tutors. He will also introduce her to the principal at Henry School, who may be able to institute her program that trains parents on how to help their children do their homework.

We look forward to the ongoing, continuing evolution of the GJC Adult Literacy Initiative, more training, more participation by GJC members, and building a spirit of community and service among GJC tutors. Lights For Liberty Vigil on July 12, 2019 by Joyce Lieberman

The GJC Refugee Immigrant Justice Initiative (RIJI) which is sponsored by the GJC Tikkun Olam Coordinating Team (TOCT) was proud to participate in "The Lights for Liberty Vigil" held on July 12 in front of Lovett Library in Mt. Airy. Betsy Teutsch's idea of a neighborhood vigil connected to the Lights for Liberty vigils taking place all over the country resulted in over 300 people protesting the current treatment of refugees, asylum seekers and especially children.

Along with GJC and neighborhood people there were many church groups represented, including St. Martin-in-the-Fields, whose Reverend Kerbel contributed inspiring words. The speakers included Betsy Teutsch, Rabbi Nancy Fuchs-Kramer, Anne Mintz, Judith Bernstein-Baker and Luis Canales who spoke about his trek from Guatamala to the US as a teenager only to be turned away four times until he was finally granted asylum. He is now a lawyer helping other immigrants and refugees. Olga Livshin read her poem "Across the Waters," and music was provided by "Voices Rising Philly" and "2 of a Kind."

GJC member Lynne Jacobs wrote, "I was especially pleased with the tone of the program. The music put everyone in the right mood, and the speakers were excellent. I described our gathering as warm and inspiring. Later I heard from folks who went to vigils in other places that they came away depressed. We created a beautiful model. The daylight hour allowed so many elders and children to join us; it was nice to have multigeneration participants."

Members of the RIJI will continue to join with other faith and secular communities in protesting the tragedy that continues to unfold at the southern US border, including separating families and housing them in prison-like detention centers. Please join us with your ideas and energy.

























DID YOU KNOW?

PINAT HA-HINUCH ~ EDUCATION CORNER

As I begin my role as Education Director at GJC, I think my earliest memories of Jewish life were Shabbat at home in Providence, RI. Every Friday evening, my whole family set the table. We gathered and my parents would light Shabbat candles, creating an aura of warmth and safety. Often, our family connected with other families from our synagogue, Temple Emanu-El. Together we created a havurah, built on a shared vision of community. We shared recipes, Shabbat songs and stories. Each



For many years I also attended Jewish summer camps. I alternated between Camp Ramah in New England and Olin-Sang-Ruby Union Institute (OSRUI) in Wisconsin. At Ramah, on Shabbat we dressed in white, prayed loudly together while sitting on benches on a basketball court. At OSRUI, services were held with our songleader, and then the camp would gather for singing and story telling—a group of 30 people grew to over 600 in one room. Recently I felt Shabbat harmony when I came to work at Camp Pembroke, an overnight camp for Jewish women. There, Shabbat



services came alive with spirit as campers, counselors, and staff held each other and celebrated the joys of Shabbat.

While each experience reflects one of my many Jewish communities, each community offers a unique version of Shabbat experience. That realization came in 1998 and 2003, when I studied in Israel at the Pardes Institute, a pluralistic Beit Midrash (school) where people of all genders and

ages studied text together. I travelled to different communities each Shabbat and fell in love with the melodies at Yakar in Jerusalem. When I lived in New York, I found the same high-energy tefillah (prayer) experience at synagogues in Manhattan.

The connections I have made around Shabbat experiences have made me believe that Jewish living and learning must happen together. I am proud to become part of the vibrant and welcoming community of GJC. I hope to meet and celebrate Shabbat with each of you.

MEMBER MEMORIES

I grew up in Mt. Airy, beginning in the late 1950s. It was actually East Mt. Airy, but we didn't call it that; we didn't know that Mt. Airy could be divided into an east and west. It was a largely Jewish neighborhood; on my block, houses with Christmas lights were a rarity. My family belonged to West Oak Lane Jewish Community Center, at Sedgwick Street and Thouron Avenue, a short two-block walk from my home, and there were at least five other synagogues only a five-minute drive away.

When we first joined WOLJCC, the only existing building was an unimpressive rectangular structure, which served as both the Hebrew School and the sanctuary. The large addition, housing the sanctuary with its magnificent stained glass windows, came later. Both of my parents were actively involved. My father joined the Board of Directors and served as synagogue president when I was twelve. He was a man with a love of Judaism, but little formal Jewish education. I remember helping him craft his Yom Kippur fundraising speech with the snippets of rabbinic wisdom I had thus far learned in Hebrew School.

My mother sang in the choir for years, and also with the Jewish Community Chorus (where she met our former cantor Sheldon Levin). As a child, I roamed the building freely, and especially loved climbing the hidden winding staircase that led from the basement of the new building to the back corner of the auditorium stage.

After Bat Mitzvah, I continued my Jewish education in the High

School Department of Gratz College and also tutored students at West Oak Lane's Hebrew School. I recall earning a whole \$1.50 an hour—three times what I could earn babysitting!

Fast forward to the 1980s—all of those other synagogues in Mt. Airy had closed or relocated to the suburbs. My daughter had just turned five, and it was time to begin her Jewish education. My husband and I attended a GJC open house for new Sunday school parents, and felt immediately at home.

A year or two after joining GJC, I was thrilled to be asked to join the Board of the Women's Club, a group of women who became a second family, and still is. I signed up to work on a variety of fundraising initiatives. Following the example set by my father, I served in a number of official roles, eventually working my way up to the presidency.

Following my mother's example, I joined the choir (although my voice is no where as beautiful as hers).

I learned to read Torah and Haftarah in one of Eve Pinkenson's earliest classes. Chanting the Haftarah at Shabbat services gives me a feeling of joy and belonging every time I do it.

My involvement in GJC has given me a place to put into practice the values and traditions that I learned as a child. I am grateful for that connection.

NEWS FROM HAZAK (55+ programming)

As many Jewish Philadelphians know, the phrase "Proclaim" Liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof...," which is inscribed on the Liberty Bell, is taken from the Torah, Leviticus 25:10. This Biblical passage aptly introduces and describes the Jubilee Year, a once in a half-century event. Liberty Bell, Jubilee Year? What's the connection? That was one of the mysteries that Elise Bromberg helped us to decipher in June, during her exclusive tour with HAZAK participants entitled "William Penn's Philadelphia." We wended though many of the sites in Old City that held religious and political significance for Penn, his progeny, and the people, institutions, and documents that he had shaped during his brief sojourns in the city. One of those documents was the Charter of Privileges, which inspired many of the human rights passages found in our U.S. Constitution. The Liberty Bell was actually cast to commemorate 50 years (i.e., the Jubilee Year) of the creation of this document.

Later in the summer, we toured the Annual Juried Exhibit at the Woodmere Museum, on the very edge of our Northwestern community. A museum docent escorted us through the exhibit of new works by local artists.

Our book group has been meeting at a new time—still the second Wednesday of each month, but at 2 PM. Recent books have included *Destiny of the Republic* by Candice Millard, *The Weight of Ink* by Rachel Kadish, and *Outwitting History* by Aaron Lansky. At July's gathering, we also honored and said goodbye to long-time

book group participant Mindelle Goldstein, who is moving to Washington, DC.

Our book for September 11 is Delia Owens' Where the Crawdads Sing. For October 16 (one week later than normal because of Yom Kippur, we will be reading Ruby Namdar's The Ruined House, in preparation for Mr. Namdar's scheduled visit to GJC at the end of October.

DID YOU KNOW?

HAZAK programs are planned for those age 55+, and are geared to reflect both common interests and get us to "stretch" to try new activities as well. Our well-attended book group meets monthly all year long. HAZAK also sponsors book talks by local authors, as well as speakers on topics of particular importance to our interests, and several times a year we show great films. WHAT'S GOING ON WITH OUR BUILDING? PART 4

As a volunteer member of our House and Design Committee, I continue to keep you posted about recent preservation and renovation efforts.

The Marcus Auditorium is a great room and we use it for all kinds of activities. This spring, after lots of study, research, samples and discussions, we have a new floor! The material is an economical, resilient composite floor tile, impervious to moisture, easy to clean, and easy on the feet. The colors and patterns work with the space and provide a new look to the room.

In addition, we added new pendant light fixtures, suspended from the existing light track on the ceiling. This is an inexpensive way to provide more options for lighting the room. They are movable and work in conjunction with the recessed downlights and the spotlights already on the tracks. During the summer, we made minor adjustments in order to be ready for fall activities and holidays.

By the way, all the light bulbs are being replaced with high efficiency LED lamps, using a fraction of the electrical power and providing a clean white light while saving money. They are on dimmers and can be adjusted for meetings, parties, events and carnivals as needed.

Also during the summer, while the GJC Hebrew School was out of session, the School Building windows received a long-needed refurbishment. The old flaking paint was removed, wood was cleaned and filled where needed, caulk was replaced, broken glass replaced, and the final coats of paint should be complete before this issue of the Call. The original woodwork is in good shape, having been protected from weather by the overhangs. We can look forward to more decades of use while preserving the building's design.

For the next edition we hope to be starting a new landscape design master plan. Stay tuned.
