Support local families who may be in sanctuary, awaiting legal appointments, or recently re-settled

The Canizales Family, Lesvin and Cindy and their sons Lesvin Isaac (11) and Wilmer Josue (9), are citizens of Honduras and are seeking asylum in the United States. They crossed the border in January 2019 and lawfully requested asylum. GJC congregant Peter Maas is the volunteer lawyer for the family. Their Merits Hearing is listed for February 2021 and this hearing will determine whether they will be granted asylum. We have provided initial support of furniture, refrigerator, household items, non-perishable food items. We can, on a monthly basis, continue to assist them with non-perishable food items and household supplies. Note that items should be delivered to Barbara Lissy's porch, 816 Carpenter Lane in Mt. Airy, not to GJC. But please email her first to let her know of the drop off. If you prefer to make a monetary contribution, please make the check payable to Barbara Lissy and mail to her at 816 Carpenter Ln. Phila. 19119, as GJC is unable to accept checks.
