A NIGHT OF LEARNING FROM EACH OTHER AND BUILDING SACRED COMMUNITY

SATURDAY, JUNE 8

Shavuot celebrates the spring harvest and recalls the revelation of Torah at Mount Sinai. Rooted in a kabbalistic tradition, Jews all around the world spend the night learning. This year, we'll begin our night with communal singing, followed by collective study on the making of a sacred learning community. We'll daven together, eat and schmooze, and study with teachers from within our community who share what they have learned in the past year. As in years past, there will be an open beit midrash in the library throughout the night, where you are invited to explore a provided text or engage in your own learning. The tikkun leyl is an opportunity to step out of normal time and into the spaciousness of the nighttime hours. Join us for the journey - it is bound to be revelatory.

We'll gather to sing niggunim (tunes) both with and without words as we close Shabbat and move into our celebration of Shavuot. Come ready to harmonize!

8:00 PM "Making a Spiritual Learning Community" with Rabbi Bec Richman

What does it take to build a spiritual learning community? We'll use excerpts from the Piezetner Rebbe's book, Chovat HaTalmidim, as a starting point for exploring pathways to deep, connected communal learning. We'll probe our own ideas about what it means to be in a learning community together, discuss questions that emerge from the text, and create an intentional foundation for the rest of our night of study. All are welcome - we will have texts available in the original and in translation, so everyone will be able to access and deepen their learning.



He also serves on the board for Pennsylvania Interfaith Power and Light, a non-profit that works with communities of faith to respond to climate change.



David Mosenkis is a data scientist and social activist. He works as a consultant for Genentech, improving insights into clinical trials data, and as a volunteer activist using data to highlight and address racial bias and other social inequities for POWER Interfaith, where he chairs the Statewide Education Team. His research demonstrating systemic racial bias in PA public school funding has sparked demand to end education apartheid. He serves as GJC's VP of Tikkun Olam, co-chairs GJC's Tikkun Olam Coordinating Team, and is a long-time leader in Dorshei Derekh.



Maria Pulzetti loves studying Torah with her GJC community. When she's not studying Torah, Maria is a staff attorney at Community Legal Services. She formerly worked as an Assistant Federal Defender in the appeals unit at the Federal Community Defender Office for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, handling capital habeas cases and criminal appeals. She is the former executive director of the Moscow-based Russian Justice Initiative, which represents victims of human rights violations at the European Court of Human Rights. She also co-founded the Day of

Silence, a student-led day of action against the silencing and erasure of LGBTQ people in schools. Maria is a graduate of the University of Virginia and Yale Law School.



Rabbi Rebecca (Bec) Richman is the incoming Assistant Rabbi and Founding Director of Koleinu Beit Midrash at GJC. Bec's rabbinic training included serving as campus rabbi for the Brandeis Reconstructionist Organization, completing a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education at the Hospital of the University of Penn, working as student rabbi at GJC, and participating in T'ruah's Year in Israel Fellowship. Bec is a Wexner Graduate Fellow and a participant in the Jewish Studio Project's inaugural

Creative Facilitator Training. Bec is a soferet (scribe), Hebrew calligrapher, ceramicist, mikveh shomeret, carrier and singer of niggunim (wordless melodies), bread baker, and triathlete. Bec and her partner, Josh, live in sunny, West Philadelphia with their sweet son, Netta Nissim.



Rabbi Alanna Sklover is the Director of Lifelong Learning at GJC. She brings her enthusiasm for creative Jewish education and a passion for creating and holding space for mindful, authentic and resonant Jewish community to every aspect of her rabbinate - whether singing with 5 year-olds, studying with a B'nei Mitzvah student, or leading a Shabbat service. He earned his A.B. from Harvard University, his ordination from HUC-JIR in New York, and his PhD at the Wharton School. He has been a member of GJC since 1986, and is a founding member of Dorshei Derekh; he served on the GJC board for nine years.



Hadassah "Dasi" Weinmartin is a seventh grade student at Greenwoods Charter School. She is an active member at GJC and recently has been organizing to start a NW Philly hub for the Sunrise movement which is a young person led activist movement to stop climate change and create green jobs.
