Our **Leadership**

DEAR VALUED MEMBER.

The strength and vibrancy of the GJC community has been a source of comfort in the painful and tumultuous days since October 7. The diversity that is one of the proud hallmarks of GJC presented special challenges as our members had many different ways of responding to the horrors of October 7 and its aftermath. I am gratified that our community has found many ways to support each other and our extended family in Israel. One immediate and lasting response has been increased security measures, most notably the presence of a security guard whenever the building is in use. We responded spiritually with prayer and meditation gatherings, the addition of special prayers for Israel and for release of the hostages, and special recognition for two assigned hostages. We publicly proclaimed our solidarity with Israel through statements and events. We increased our understanding through an ongoing series of informational programs presenting diverse perspectives from some of our members and outside experts. We completed a successful fundraiser for Magen David Adom to purchase an ambulance. We organized forums for members to listen, talk with, and support each other.

Not long after our informative Charry weekend on antisemitism, GJC unfortunately experienced directly the ugly scourge of antisemitism, with the first of two bomb threats. I am grateful to Nina Peskin for her competent crisis management during these incidents, in collaboration with our security consultants and the Philadelphia Police.

Yet even as we dealt with these difficult and unprecedented attacks on Israel and threats to our community, we continued to flourish as a congregation. Our membership is stable and our financial situation is solid. Our Early Childhood Program and Religious School have never been stronger, as they continue to attract and warmly embrace and educate the younger generation. We welcomed a diverse array of inspirational leaders for our Friday night services this year, and our shabbat morning minyanim continued to flourish.

I appointed an ad-hoc committee that has been considering ways to make our building, services, and programming accessible to the broadest range of people, including those with disabilities. The Accessibility Committee's work has already resulted, in collaboration with the House and Design Committee, with recommendations that are being acted on to create an ADA-compliant entrance ramp to our main entrance, and a new sukkah that will be much more accessible to those with limited mobility. Another ad-hoc committee has been addressing ways we can build community across our different shabbat morning prayer groups. GJC proudly supported the launch of the Shtetl 2.0 organization, dedicated to supporting vibrant and connected aging in place in Northwest Philadelphia.

We completed a successful fundraising campaign for a new roof and solar panels, whose installation was completed in March, and by the time you read this, should be providing clean, cost-free electricity for about half of the electrical needs of our education building. GJC's Tikkun Olam initiatives included educational programs on climate change and racism, as well as support of refugees, both hands-on with a newly adopted refugee family, and through advocacy for humane refugee policies.

We bade a temporary farewell to Rabbi Zeff as he began a well-deserved and overdue sabbatical and welcomed Reba Carmel onto our staff as our Visiting Rabbi until Rabbi Zeff's return in September. I am especially grateful to Executive Director Nina Peskin for her steady leadership during this very challenging year. And I appreciate the rest of our exceptional staff for their dedication in ensuring the smooth operation of our complex and wonderful community.

A notable number of teens who began in ECP celebrated their Brit Mitzvah and this year's Confirmation class are from second and third generation GJC member families. Opportunities for adults to engage with theology, rabbinic thought, the weekly Torah portion filled KBM's calendar this year as did multiple learning opportunities from our constituent groups. Joyful and creative musical Kabbalat Shabbat services highlighted our community's commitment to joyful prayer. With all that we have accomplished this year under often trying circumstances, we are thriving. To continue to do so requires the joint commitment of many people, including members, outside donors, and foundations who support our mission. We benefit from the ideas and feedback

they share with us and through the financial gifts that they generously donate to us to allow us to continue to be here to serve this community for many years to come. We can only flourish and move forward because of this crucial support, and we are so grateful to all of those who provide it; you will see their names listed with pride and appreciation in the pages of this report.

It is ancient Jewish wisdom that we cannot live our best lives alone. We need each other to become who we are. We are changed by interacting with each other, cheered by celebrating together, and comforted by the support of others in times of grief and trauma. Our Connection to Israel

Introduction by GJC President, David Mosenkis

GJC members have always had many ways of relating to Israel. Over the years, we have had programs that presented diverse perspectives on controversial issues, and programs that focused on less controversial aspects of Israeli culture and society. Since October 7, the differences among our members' perspectives on Israel has presented special challenges in how we have responded as a community. We have sought to learn from each other, find common ground, respect differences, and strive toward a relationship with Israel that reflects the deep convictions of our members and strengthens our bonds as a community. This is no easy feat, but what synagogue has a better shot at being a place where people who disagree can be in community together? I trust that GJC will continue to build on its successful legacy as a diverse congregation that has stayed rooted in Jewish tradition, while grappling in bold, thoughtful, and innovative ways with the challenges of a changing world.

GJC offered our community times to gather and process our response to the war in these ways:

- Two were held for the community to grieve
- Six listening sessions held by various subcommunities with 122 participants including adults and teens
- One for college students to share their experiences on campus
- · One for parents of college students
- One for students who were experiencing antisemitism
- One meditation on peace in Israel and Gaza

STUDY

We had a wonderful year of learning in Koleinu Beit Midrash! We offered thirteen different classes, and 188 people learned in our Beit Midrash. Studying Torah together gives us the opportunity to connect with others and to bring the wisdom of our tradition into our daily lives.

In two classes, our clergy offered tools for grappling with the challenges of the war (and other challenges too): Both/And Thinking with Wendy Smith and Rabbi Adam Zeff, and Theology in a Time of Tragedy with Rabbi Reba Carmel. Our first co-sponsorship with Women of GJC, Shabbat Liturgy Through a Woman's Lens, taught by Rabbi Beth Janus, helped people make meaningful and new connections to our liturgy, and we hope to continue the collaboration. GJC's many member rabbis and cantors had an opportunity to study Talmud together in our first Clergy Study Group, and we offered our first intergenerational class, Trans Halakha, co-sponsored with Teen Tuesday and taught by nationally-known educator Laynie Soloman. We convened two weekly Torah study groups, offered several one-time talks by people who are leaders in their fields, and much more!

We capped off the year with an all-night study session for Tikkun Leyl Shavuot, joining with our sister congregations Mishkan Shalom and P'nai Or to study Torah until sunrise!

Our Youth and Families

GINAT SHABBAT OVERHAUL

Lyndall Miller breathed new life into the weekly Ginat Shabbat services for families with children under 6 years old. Working with ECP teacher, Sydney Toussaint, Lyndall updated the service she created several decades ago to the delight of the 15 families who have been attending on a semi-regular basis. The highlight of the service is always the parsha story that is told with puppets, props, and scenery - all invented and constructed by Lyndall.

FAMILY SHABBAT

The Charry Minyan continued to welcome in children and families for five Family Shabbat Services. This year, most of the services were led by Youth and Families Director, Morah Abby Weinberg. Each service included parts led by children and parents and highlighted in a different grade. There was ample time for multi-generational schmoozing and connecting over a kiddush with everyone's favorites: pizza bagels and ice cream sandwiches!

TEEN-LED YOUTH PROGRAMS

This year amazing GJC Teen Youth Group continued to flourish under the leadership of teacher Bridget Seigel-Fultz, President Dasi Weinmartin and Vice President Sadie Wade. Teens organized potluck Sukkot and Hanukkah parties, participated in a city-wide Youth Summit on Gun Violence, slept over in the synagogue, delivered JRA boxes in Northwest Philadelphia - and much more!

INTENSIVE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOR RELIGIOUS SCHOOL TEACHERS

We were very lucky this year to be able to send four RS teachers, and the Director, to participate in the Makom Community's local Jewish Placemaking Accelerator. The Accelerator program gives teachers and education directors from four selected congregations in the Greater Philadelphia area roughly 20 hours of professional development, including monthly seminars, coaching, congregational school observation, and a visit to Makom's Lab School. Teachers were able to learn new ways of inspiring students with the wisdom of Judaism while making it relevant to their world. We are especially grateful to the Schwartz family for the financial support to take advantage of this opportunity to improve our school!

YOUNG FAMILIES

GJC families with children under six years old became organized under the leadership of Rabbi Megan GoldMarche. Megan brought together a group of ECP and other parents to ensure that the GJC programing for their families met their needs and was well communicated. There is now a clear calendar of 1-2 events per month specifically for this age group and much enthusiastic participation by parents and kids!

HAVDALAH POTLUCKS

The Religious School Committee of Parents resumed their efforts to organize Havdalah Potlucks for each grade hosted by families in that grade. These potlucks are wonderful community-building opportunities and allow parents and kids to get to know each other in a low-key, fun environment with good food and fun. 






Our **Responsibility**

BUILDING FUND

 Our building fund collects roughly \$60,000 annually which is used for maintaining our communal home.

BUILDING PROJECTS AT GJC

- The Women of GJC's annual Building Beautiful campaign this year helped fund a 10' X 24' shade sail for our playground, as well as a renovation of the picnic area with new picnic tables. These new additions will provide much-needed shade for the ECP children and a nice place to enjoy lunch or a snack.
- Howard Spodek was a long-time member of GJC and an active member of Dorshei Derekh. Howard's deep connection to the GJC community and the value he placed on the synagogue prompted him to leave an extremely generous, unrestricted bequest of \$162,000. When we were notified about this gift, much care and consideration was given to Howard and what was important to him. We know that Howard deeply loved gathering with the GJC community, and that justice and equity issues, including accessibility, were important to him. Therefore, the lay leadership determined that we would use the bequest to fund two projects: a new sukkah and a ramp to the office entrance.
- We are deeply grateful to Howard for prioritizing GJC in this way, and his gift will go a long way to enriching our community.

OUR NEW INITIATIVE

- After decades of discussion and effort, the GJC community in Northwest Philly now has an eruv. An eruv is a boundary that symbolically extends a private area into the public domain. An eruv makes it permissible by Jewish law to carry personal items within that area on Shabbat. Such items include keys, bags, babies, and even strollers. Beyond the halakhic significance of the eruv, it is a physical manifestation of the existence of a vibrant and engaged Jewish community. It is a real asset in attracting new residents to our neighborhood and a testament to the dedication of GJC and its members to supporting Jewish life in Northwest Philadelphia. A map of the eruv boundaries is available on the GJC website. It includes roughly the area between Stenton Avenue, Willow Grove Avenue, the Wissahickon Creek, and Washington Lane.
- Our eruv would not have been possible without the efforts and leadership of Rabbi Zeff, Rabbi Carmel, and the members of the Eruv Committee. The process was daunting and complicated. It required mapping the area to be enclosed using current utility poles, soliciting cooperation from PECO to permit the addition of small tubes and tube caps to the poles for the eruv, and getting official recognition from City Council and the Mayor. GJC is grateful to Rabbi Zeff, Religious Committee Chair Neil Actor, Charlie Miller, and Denise Wolf for their energy and efforts in bringing this to fruition. Going forward, the eruv will be inspected by volunteers before Shabbat to make sure it is intact. GJC will also be responsible for making any necessary repairs. The information on the status of the eruv will be posted on the GJC website.
